TRACK STARS PREPARING FOR K. C. A. C. MEET

Hamilton, Parker, Lewis, "Fuzzy" Williams and Saville Show Up Well in Daily Try-outs.

MASSENGALE WONT RUN

Coach Simpson Considers That Missouri Has Hardest Schedule It Has Ever Had.

"On your marks—get set—BANG!" At the report of the pistol four little looking athletes sprang forward and headed for the tape that stretched across the board track fifty yards away.

At the half-way mark all four runners with heads thrown back, their chests heaving, and their arms working perfectly in a backward and forward motion, were neck and neck.

"Bob" Simpson stood at the tape with his thumb on the stop-watch ready to catch the time in which the runner covered the distance. At the forty-yard mark two runners were leading by about a half yard. Gradually these two lengthened their lead until when they lunged across the finish line they were a yard in advance of the other runners. It was a tie race and the time was 5.25 seconds.

Missouri colors in the coming track meets.

Coach Simpson has twelve letter men around which to mold a winning team. The seven letter men not named above are: McClung, weight man; Henderson and Saville, distance men; Albus, hurdler; Roney and Maxwell, 440-yard and half mile runners; and George Williams, high jumper.

The biggest disappointment to Missouri fans comes in the announcement that George Massengale, running mate of Jack Scholtz last year, will not be in condition to compete in the indoor meets. The Webster Groves boy has a bad leg, which he sustained while training for the Olympic meet last summer. While he may get in shape for the outdoor meets, there is no chance of his being entered in the indoor classics. Until Massengale's leg mends, men not so well known will run the sprints for Missouri. Those from whom the sprinters in the coming indoor meets will be picked are "Fuzzy" Williams, Elmer Ker-shaw, the St. Louis boy that grabbed a forward pass in the Washington football game and turned a defeat into a victory, Harrab, Wooda, Hames, Fullbright, En-ark, Levy, Miller and Utz.

Distance men doing the best work at present are Bradfield, Saville, Henderson, Hanson, Fickett, Towbridge, Hammer, and Vickroy. Winans, of whom much was expected, has a broken arm.

The men from whom the team will get its hurdlers are Albus, "Fuzzy" Williams, Hart, Humes and Pearce. Some of the half-milers are Roney, Zrker, Hays, Blum and Stank.

"Chuck" Lewis and Hamilton are leading the way in the pole vault event, with Edward Lewis, Johnson and Leaver showing some promise.

McClung, who won his letter last year, is receiving his best competition in the weight events from Scott, Ogil, Bardwell and Hill.

According to Simpson, in spite of the statement in the University Kansan that the Jayhawkers' most dangerous meet would occur Saturday when the Mt. Orland athletes will compete with the Kansas Aggies in the first Valley dual meet of the year, Missouri expects to enter men in the coming K. C. A. C. and Kansas-Missouri indoor meets that will at least give the K. U. runners keen competition.

The Missouri Coach is taking advantage of the spring weather while it lasts and is gradually whipping his men into shape for the K. C. A. C. invitation meet to be held in Convention Hall, Kansas City, February 26. The former Tiger hurdler refuses to give out any definite information as to what men will make the trip. Simpson considers this year's schedule the most grueling that the school has ever tackled. From February 25 to June 4 the Tiger runners will

compete in nine important meets. Following is the complete schedule:

March 5—Illinois relay games at Urbana.

March 18—Kansas-Missouri dual meet in Kansas City.

April 23—Drake relay games at Des Moines.

April 30—Pennsylvania relay games.

May 14—Missouri-Oklahoma dual meet at Columbia.

May 21—Kansas-Missouri dual meet at Lawrence.

May 27 and 28—Missouri Valley Conference meet at St. Louis.

June 3 and 4—Western Conference meet.

BROWNING HAS HIT HIS STRIDE

Tiger Captain Played First Real Ball of Season Against Aggies.

When the Aggies were defeated at Manhattan last week the Kansas Aggie players were unanimous in the opinion that Captain Browning of the Tigers was the most potent factor in the Gold and Black victory. As one of the Missouri coaches expressed it, "Fidge played his first real basketball of the season."

There have been changes and mishaps on the Tiger team this year, and the biggest shifts have involved the Missouri captain.

Assistant Coach Ruby and Director Clevenger in a conference at the opening of the season decided to place Browning at forward, as forward material was less plentiful than defensive.

It meant that his chances for making the all-conference quintet in his last year as a contestant in the Valley were lessened considerably.

Owing to the injury of his ankle, which placed him upon the bench for several weeks, it was not until the K. U. series that he was able to take part in any games. At this time, (these being his first Valley games, he was not in good condition.)

There is no doubt but that Browning would have made an all-conference job at guard this season and there are many who contend that he is fairly sure of a forward berth.

George Browning played considerable basketball before coming to Missouri. He is the fifth Missouri captain in six years to be named from the Westport High School alumni. At Westport Browning was a forward, being converted into a guard by John F. Miller two years ago. George has a younger brother, Arthur, who is a regular on the Varsity this year.

Bob Simpson Shows UP TIGER HURDLERS IN HIS FIRST WORKOUT

Several of the track men are enjoying a joke at the expense of the two crack hurdlers of the squad, Fuzzy Williams and Eddie Hart. Williams won his letter last year. Hart was ineligible, but is expected to tear things up on the boards this winter and on the cinders in the spring.

Last Monday the two hurdlers were both way off in their work and Coach Simpson informed them that he would come out the following day and show them both up. The entire track squad, including the two hurdlers, took it as pretty much of a joke and supposed that the coach was kidding them.

On Tuesday the former world's champion hurdler appeared in his running togs, much to the surprise of many of the team and onlookers, who understood that he had given up all training.

A greater surprise was furnished, however, when he clicked over the hurdles in the same form as of old, running the 50 yard low hurdle 61.5 seconds, and easily defeated the two Tiger sprinters who had been working out daily. It was Coach Simpson's first workout of the season. When questioned as to how he remained in condition, the Tiger mentor replied that he was always in condition. Running as he did Tuesday, Robert I. Simpson could go out and beat the best hurdlers in the game today.

OKLAHOMA U. PLANS TOUR

Tennis Manager Books Sooner Team For 29 Matches.

NORMAN, OKLA., Feb. 17.—The University of Oklahoma tennis team will play twenty-nine matches, nineteen of them singles, with eight different universities on their trip into the north, beginning May 7 at Lawrence, Kan., and ending May 18 at St. Louis. Ben K. Parks, manager of the Sooner tennis team, has received confirmation on all of the proposed matches for the tour, including Kansas, Chicago, Northwestern, Michigan, Detroit, Indiana, Illinois and Washington, in the order named.

The Sooner tennis team will be made up of the Parks brothers, Ben and Kitt-lard, and Forrest Darrough as an alternate. Darrough was a member of the Monnet-Darrough pair that made a similar trip into the north last spring when

they won every match played with Kansas, Drake and Wisconsin, broke even with Chicago in six matches and lost to the Washington tennis team, two to one.

The present team, according to paper comparisons, appears even stronger than the 1920 pair. The Parks brothers met most of the men they will play on the tour when they attended the inter-Collegiate tennis meet at Cleveland and the national meet at Boston last summer.

TIGERS PRAISE AGGIE SPIRIT Possess Unbeatable Sportsmanship After Losing Title.

An incident of the Kansas Aggie trip which will long be remembered by the Tiger basketball squad occurred after the second game. The game, it will be remembered, was won by the Tigers only by displaying perhaps the best basketball they have played this season.

The loss of the game, before as large a crowd as has ever attended a game in Manhattan and, meaning as it did the winning of the Aggies' championship hopes, must have been a keen disappointment.

After the game was over the members of the Aggie squad and the president of the college came to the dressing room of the Missouri five and congratulated them on their fine playing and clean sportsmanship, which is another illustration of the unbeatable sportsmanship of the Kansas Aggies.

M. U. Graduate Speaks Here.

Dr. J. W. Pryor, who was graduated from the University in 1876 and now is professor of anatomy and physiology at the University of Kentucky, delivered a lecture at the Biology Building yesterday on "The Difference in the Ossification of the Male and the Female Skeleton."

He has drawn the conclusions that ossification begins sooner than authorities on the subject say it does, and that it begins sooner and progresses more rapidly in the female skeleton than in the male. He discovers that the sex of embryos can be distinguished by the appearance of certain bones before any other differentiation is noticeable.
