In disposing of the American League pennant, however, there is just the slightest concern to find out what Tris Speaker will have to say about vacating the front line trenches that he took last fall.

Looking over the world's champion Indians, one gets fairly hit in the face with the impression that Tris Speaker will have quite a lot to say.

Speaker thinks so well of his champions that he didn't turn a hand all winter to improve the club. Other clubs went through a hectic winter of trades and attempted trades, but Speaker went hunting.

On dope, unreliable as it may be sometimes, the Cleveland tribe should repeat and win their second pennant.

They face the same rosy prospects that the Cincinnati Reds had last spring, but it is almost a certain fact that Speaker will not allow the Indians to follow the wild ways that wrecked the Moran bunch.

"Duster" Mails practically won the pennant for the Indians last year. That stealing southpaw came just at the opportune moment when the great Stan Coveleskie and Jim Bagby were about to break down under the terrific burden of carrying the club alone.
