The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at Columbia, Mo., on April 23, 1921 as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at McLaine and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$423— for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be at full age for all purposes at eighteen years, women eighteen years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application blanks, Form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

DOUBLE-HEADER FOR TOMORROW

Drenching of Grounds Prevents Missouri-Drake Game This Afternoon.

Grounds drenched by last night's rain and fear of more rain this afternoon prevented Missouri's baseball nine from swinging into action today against the Drake Bulldogs. A double-header will be played tomorrow afternoon, the first game commencing at 2 o'clock.

Although Coach Miller has not had time to drill his pitching staff into mid-season form, the Tiger boxmen should have no difficulty in staving off the Drake batters in the double session. Six twirlers, two of them of exceptional ability and the others believed to be fully the equals of the average in the Valley, are ready to turn back the opposing sluggers.

The line-up for the first game will probably be the same as that announced for today.

EXPLAINS TRACK TRAINING

Oregon U. Coach Says 100-Yard Men Not Always Good at 220.

Most sprinters who run the 100-yard dash generally enter the 220-yard dash also. This is a much harder race, and the 100-yard man is not always successful at the 220-yard dash, for the reason that it takes more and harder work to stand up under the strain of the longer sprint. The systems of training for both are much alike, only the 220-yard runner must develop a longer and easier stride. The runner must know himself and his ability to finish. Many boys run so hard at the first half that they are completely run off their feet and consequently tie up at the finish.

In all 440-yard tracks the start of the 220-yard is generally a short distance from the turn. I would advise all young runners to sail the turn. Starting as fast as possible the runner swings into a stride that will carry as much speed without a great deal of effort until the last 75 yards. As a rule the best 220-yard men are those who can run a great, or distance, the best of them being able to go at the same easy swing for 300 or 350 yards.

Since the race requires endurance, the candidate should practice swinging through 300 yards, always running within himself. If the 220-yard man is to run the 100 also, the starting and sprinting will be sufficient, but he should vary the training, taking two or three 300 yards at the three-quarter speed and once a week go through 180 at 220-speed. Two days before the race a rest should be taken, just doing enough to loosen up—perhaps a 300 at one-half speed.

SAVILLE TAKING TREATMENT

Massengale Practically Well—Was in Hospital Last Month.

A mile runner on the track team of the University of Missouri, came to Kirksville Saturday, for examination and treatment at the A. S. O. Hospital.

The man is C. M. Saville, who is taking electrical engineering courses at M. U.

He had the same trouble as did George P. Massengale, M. U. track star, who was under treatment here last month.

Coach Robert I. Simpson has been sending a number of his men up here for examination by Dr. George Still, and these two among others have been turned over for treatment to Dr. H. S. Hain.

The trouble in both cases was an inordinate lesion and tilted pelvis, caused, according to Dr. Hain's theory, by running on an indoor track.

Saville has been here only two days but the pain in his back is already gone and it is expected that the ache in his leg will very soon leave also.

He reports that Massengale is getting along all right. It will be remembered that Massengale was instructed to lay off for six weeks.

Not that they've got a grudge on Germany, nor that they don't like the long, rainy days a good time, nor yet again that they're anti-German. No, none of these things, but they wearied of being "hobbed" so they rambled on today.

"We could certainly have had a helluva time if left to ourselves. We did break out of corral a couple of times and range about," said one, while a colleague allowed: "Well, Berlin is quite

a city, but I can't see as its got much on Kansas City, at that."

Whereupon another buddy chirped up, and allowed as how the Lone Star State was good enough for him.

This being hobbled was a case of being dragged about to see a lot of things they didn't want to see, and more particularly of being forced to listen to extra long lectures on this, that, and the other. It may be remarked in passing that when a German gets a chance to talk, he has n't any idea of when his license expires. It might never expire were it not for the fact that somebody else also has a hankering to talk.
