## UNIVERSITY TO GRADUATE 584 ON APRIL 27

Baccalaureate Address to Be Given by the Rev. Nelson Spencer of Kansas City.

J. G. SHURMAN TO SPEAK Commencement Exercises Will Extend From Sermon Sunday to Graduation on Wednesday.

The seventy-ninth annual commencement at the University of Missouri will be April 24 to 27. Five hundred and eighty-four members of the senior class are candidates for graduation. This year's graduation exercises will be practically the same as those of last year with the exception of the University Women's play, which will be held at a later date, according to Dr. George Lefevre, chairman of the exercise committee. The two main commencement speakers will be the Rev. Nelson Spencer, D. D., rector of the Grace Trinity Church, Kansas City, who will deliver the baccalaureate address, and Jacob Gould Shurman, LL. D., president emeritus of Cornell University, who will give the commencement address.

The Rev. Robert Nelson Spencer is widely known in church circles. He is a graduate of Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., and the Nesbit and Kansas Theological schools. He was ordained by Bishop L. W. Millsbaugh in 1894 and later on in the same year he was ordained as a priest by Bishop Charles P. Anderson. In 1905-7 he was rector of the Church of the Covenant, Junction City, Kan., and at the same time served as army chaplain at Fort Riley, Kan. In 1907-9 he was rector of the St. Charles Church at Springfield, Mo. Since then he has served as rector of the Grace Trinity Church, Kansas City, Mo.

The Reverend Spencer was a clerical delegate to the last tri-annual general convention at Detroit in 1909 and he is now secretary of the standing committee of diocese of West Missouri.

**ATTENDED 12 UNIVERSITIES**  
Jacob Gould Shurman is known as a scholar, statesman and writer. As a student he attended the Universities of London, Paris, Edinburgh, Heidelberg, Berlin, Göttingham, Columbia, Yale, Harvard, Dartmouth, Brown and Pennsylvania. From 1892 to 1926 he was president of Cornell University. He was president of the first Philippine commission and spent practically a year in the Philippine Islands. From 1912-13 he was minister to Greece and Montenegro. And in 1917-18 he was a member of the New York State Food Commission.

The following are some of his works: "The Ethical Import of Darwinism," "Belief in God," "Agnosticism and Religion," "A Generation of Cornell," "Philippine Affairs" (a retrospect and outlook) and "Why America Is in the War."

His home is in Ithaca, New York. The schedule of the exercises is as follows:

The Commencement Exercises will be held in the University Auditorium at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning. The academic procession will be led by Lieutenant Colonel Persons, U. S. A., as Chief Marshal.
