WON'T ENTER TENNIS TEAM

Committee Makes Decision at Meeting Yesterday Afternoon.

There will be no University tennis team entered at the fourteenth annual Missouri Valley Track and Field Meet, to be held on Francis Field at Washington University May 27 and 28. This was decided at a meeting held yesterday afternoon of the Athletic Committee of the University. The Valley tennis tournament is always held in connection with the Valley Conference meet. There is no University tennis team in readiness. The Missouri Valley Conference of Faculty Representatives will also be held in St. Louis Friday, May 27, at the University Club. There will be several suggested changes in the Conference regulations brought up at the meeting, among them, the following:

By the University of Missouri: "Should members of the freshman teams be awarded as champions a numerical only, or numerical with a jersey, or a numerical with a sweater?" By Iowa State College: "Rules and regulations governing the playing of non-Conference teams by members of the Conference." By the University of Kansas: "The present status of sportsmanship represented in most of our baseball contests." To Article IV, Section 7, paragraph D, add: "A training table is understood to mean any segregation of an athletic team or squad at any or all meals during the athletic season, except while on trips."

Article V, Section 7, change to read: "No student shall participate in any intercollegiate contest who has served as a coach or director of athletics or has engaged in athletics professionally for remuneration for a period of four months or more in any one year nor for a total of more than six months." Article V, Section 8, l. a., add A, paragraph B, as follows: "No student will be eligible to participate in intercollegiate athletics after a residence at his college of more than four academic years, if during such residence he has failed in his studies to the extent of sixteen credit hours or more."

Entrants for the singles should get in touch with each other as soon as possible, in order to finish the preliminary rounds. Sets will be defaulted if not played off by tomorrow night. Scores will be posted at the gymnasium, where they should be handed in directly after play.

TIGER TRACK STARS INJURED

Hamilton, Roney and Parker Take Spill in Cinders in Workout.

Missouri chances for victory in the dual meet with Kansas this week came close to receiving a severe setback Monday afternoon when three Varsity athletes took a bad spill on the cinders. Hamilton, Roney and Parker were taking a fast spin on the back side of the track and when Roney attempted to dash ahead of his opponents all three were sent spinning. Hamilton was accidentally spiked in the heel while Roney and Parker, star quarter-milers, were bruised by the cinders. It was at first thought that Hamilton's injury would be serious but he was able to walk without any sign of a limp on Tuesday.

Coach Simpson is banking heavily on Hamilton in this week's clash with the Jayhawkers and any injury to the all-around performer would play havoc with the chances of the Tiger track team in the coming meets. In the meet with the ancient rivals at Lawrence this week Hamilton is expected to score in the pole-vault, broad jump, javelin and possibly in the discus and shot-put. Coach Simpson has three fairly good discus-throwers in McClung, Hamilton and Lincoln. He is uncertain which of the two will leave the plate in the meet Friday.

Allan Lincoln surprised everyone Monday afternoon by taking his place with the sprinters and practicing a few starts. The knee which he injured in the sprinters is rapidly regaining strength; yet it is unlikely that the Tiger track coach will be able to use him this season. Lincoln came to Missouri two years ago with a record of several sprint marks. These he lived up to in freshman track and proved that he could step along with the Varsity sprinters. By next year, with no further injury to his leg, he will cause plenty of trouble for the best in the Valley. If he could be used this week against Kansas and next week in the Valley meet, the problem of finding a good sprinter would be solved. In the short dash events indulged in Monday he showed that even in his present condition he has as much speed in him as many on the Varsity squad at the present time.

Tiger tracksters will finish up their training for the week this afternoon and will depart Thursday afternoon at 4:20 o'clock for Kansas City. Friday morning they will proceed to Lawrence and in the afternoon clash with the best Schlademan of the Kansas has to offer in the way of track artists.
