

MAY HARNESS CONGO'S POWER

Belgian Engineer Says African River Could Supply Electricity to All Europe.

BRUSSELS (By Mail to United Press).—Transmission of sufficient motive power from Africa to drive all the trains, light all the towns, and run all the factories of Europe is the aim of a scheme described here by the Belgian engineer, F. Anderheggen, in the "National Belge."

The Congo River, in Africa, said the originator of the plan, discharges at least 80,000 cubic meters of water per second, from its reservoir at Stanley Pool, over the Livingston Falls to the sea outlet at Boma and Matadi.

Two hundred million horsepower is thus wasted, said Mr. Anderheggen, who suggested that this vast mass of water-force should be carried through pipes under high pressure into electric generators in the Lower Congo.

Thence in the form of high tension electric current, this vast power would be sent to Europe, along the Atlantic coast, through Senegal and Morocco, and beneath the straits of Gibraltar.

Carried over a distance of some six thousand kilometers, the power originally available at the source would suffer a loss of fifty per cent; but enough would still remain for the haulage, lighting and factory power requirements of Europe, he asserted.

This scheme, says its daring originator, is no more utopian than the Panama Canal scheme. First, there is plenty of native labor available in the Congo. Second, the cement, iron, copper and other requirements are no more difficult to obtain for this purpose than for that of railway building.

Proportionately, the job would cost no more than the railway that is going to link up Leopoldville and Katanga. Less time would be required for this job than was needed for cutting the Panama Canal.



Commodity Conditions

Some Grocery Prices Are Rising

For the first time in twelve months, there are more advances in grocery items than declines. This seems to indicate that the bottom has been reached in food values and that a gradual advance during the next few months may be expected.

We do not advise, however, reckless or indiscriminate buying for we feel that some items will continue to decline. A close study of all markets and the conditions surrounding each commodity must be made, before knowing the items to buy or not to buy. Most of our principal grain crops are large, and prices now average near pre-war.

In the canning industry, however, there will be a shortage of almost all products, although in some commodities there is a surplus carried over from last year. The quantity of California fruits, both canned and dried (although much lower in price now than last year) will be much less than the average. This is also true of salmon, tuna, apples, cherries and a large number of other items. Canned tomatoes, corn, peas and asparagus are also below the average pack and advances are predicted by the packers of these items.
