E. W. Stephens, head of the Stephens Publishing Co., established in Columbia in 1878. From 1871 to 1906 he was editor of the Columbia, Missouri, Herald. For years he was president of the National Editorial Association. He is also a leading Baptist in state and national church affairs.

### LIVE IN COLONIAL HOME

The house in which Mr. and Mrs. Stephens live stands at it did sixty years ago when Colonel Sloss built it. It is a stately colonial house set in a large yard and flanked by trees and shrubbery. Inside, it is essentially a family home, with portraits on the wall of the ancestors who gave distinction to the family, with the great cases of books which have lent culture to the family, and with exquisite furnishings and tapestries that reflect the refinement of the family.

Equally charming to their friends today, as ever, are Mr. and Mrs. Stephens. The years have brought them, not to old age but to a mellowness, distinctive and remarkable. Mrs. Stephens is not so slender and her yellow hair has changed to gray, but her face has the same sweet expression and her eyes the same eager look of the bride of fifty years ago. Mr. Stephens, too, is more portly, and his hair is no longer black. But, erect and alert, he is still manager of one of the greatest business concerns in Columbia. And his benignant face and kindly eyes bespeak his life of generous deeds and thoughtfulness for others.

Mr. and Mrs. Stephens are the parents of four children: Hugh Stephens of Jefferson City; James L. Stephens of St. Louis; E. Sidney Stephens of Columbia; and Mrs. Ashley Gray of St. Louis. They also have three grandchildren, Laura Moss Stephens, Ashley Gray, Jr., and Laura Moss Gray.

## Grocers Now Have New Fall Vegetables for Housewife's Use

"What shall I have for dinner?" Columbia markets are trying to help the housewife answer this question each week. New vegetables, fruits and meats are coming in every day now. Cauliflower is one of the cheapest and best vegetables in September and October. In selecting it choose the cauliflower that has the white head and fresh green leaves. Dark spots on the heads indicate that they are not fresh. If the housewife has been serving the family creamed cauliflower here are some recipes to vary the monotony:

**CAULIFLOWER A LA GRATIN**  
Place a whole cooked cauliflower on a dish for serving, cover with buttered crumbs and place on oven grate to brown. After the crumbs are browned, remove the cauliflower from the oven and pour over it a thin white sauce.

**CAULIFLOWER A LA PARISEAN**  
This dish is prepared just like cauliflower a la Gratin only the cauliflower is covered with grated bread crumbs.

Turnips are on the market again. One grocer says that he is having a good season for Idaho primes. These are good when preserved or dried.

Shipments of cranberries are beginning to arrive in Columbia now. A housewife who is said to make things that "just melt in your mouth" recommends frozen cranberries as a substitute for cranberry jelly or sauce. Here is the recipe for this appetizing and attractive relish:

**FROZEN CRANBERRIES**  
4 cups cranberries  
2 1/2 cups sugar  
1 1/2 cups boiling water

Pick over and wash the cranberries, add water and sugar and cook ten minutes, skimming during the cooking. Rub the berries through a sieve, cool and pour into one-pound baking powder boxes. Pack in salt and ice, using equal parts, and let stand four hours. If there is not sufficient mixture to fill two boxes, add water to make up the desired quantity. On the cool days that come now and

then in the fall the economical housewife will have soup for luncheon or dinner. She does not have to buy even a soup boue if she saves the bones from roasts and steaks.

Among other meats appropriate for this time of the year are veal loaf, sausage and liver. There is every kind of sausage the housewife could desire at the Columbia meat markets.

There is a large selection to be had in fruit. Tokay and Malgra grapes are good to start out the breakfast with and add to the attractiveness of any salad. When used in salad, split or halve the grapes and take out the seeds. The grapes should be cold and the last thing to go into the salad. The Thompson seedless grapes have all gone now. If looking for something very unusual, the housewife may buy Japanese persimmons. These are almost as large as oranges, seedless and when real red, as sweet as any fruit one could desire.
