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STATE THIRD IN FRUIT ACREAGE

Acreeage of State in 1919 Was 249,084—Michigan Ranks First.

Missouri ranks third in the acreage of small fruits in the United States, according to the announcement of the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census at Washington. This is for the year 1919 in a comparative list with 1909.

The total acreage of small fruit in the United States for 1919 was 249,084 as compared with 272,460 in 1909, representing a decrease of 23,376 acres, or 8.6 per cent.

The states reporting the largest acreage in small fruits in 1919 were Michigan, with 21,021 acres; New York with 20,412 acres; Missouri, with 16,768 acres; and New Jersey, with 15,374 acres.

The yield in quarts for 1919 was 325,096,968 as compared with 425,565,863 quarts in 1909, a decrease of 101,468,895 quarts or 23.8 per cent.

The small fruits considered in the report are strawberries, raspberries, loganberries, blackberries, cranberries, dewberries, currants and other berries.

In the production of strawberries Missouri ranked second with an acreage of 8,645. Tennessee ranked first with 10,876 acres; Arkansas third with 8,324 and Michigan fourth with 8,048 acres.

The production of strawberries in the United States shows a decrease of 78,770,485 quarts or 30.8 per cent.

Missouri did not rank in the four leading states in the production of raspberries, loganberries, cranberries or currants, but ranked third in blackberries and dewberries with a yield of 2,958,000 quarts. Texas ranked first, and Washington second in these fruits.

The United States is divided into sections for listing of production and acreage. Missouri is in the west north central geographical division, which also includes Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska and Kansas.

The total production of this section in 1919 was 37,368,041 quarts. Missouri having 17,769,936 quarts of that amount. In acreage Missouri had 16,768 acres of the total 35,322 acres for the section.

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
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
