DR. YOUNG DEFINES GOD Yesterday's Was the First of a Series of His Sermons.

He said, "God is man, with man at his highest and noblest, without any taint of imperfection. The Greeks thought of God as like themselves, but they clothed their gods with all of the human imperfections."

"Jesus portrayed God as personal, not abstract. In him we find the perfect mirror of God, and his life and work is only a reflection of the personality of God."
