MISS SEGSWORTH SPEAKS People Are Less Satisfied, She Says to Y. W. C. A.

"The bubble of satisfaction that characterized the world before 1914 is forever gone," said Miss Beulah Segsworth, traveling secretary of the Student Volunteer Band, in her talk before the Y. W. C. A. yesterday afternoon. "Every nation, as well as every individual, is in a state of unrest. They want something and they do not know what it is. This state is more acute in other countries than in America."

Miss Segsworth said that she did not experience a miraculous "call" to the foreign mission field. Her decision was merely an answer to the great need and the conviction that that was where God wanted her. She had no reason for not going. She asked the girls of the Y. W. C. A. to consider both sides of the question and decide it for themselves.

"It is the L-O-S-S in everyone that I am interested in," Miss Segsworth said. "It is the things that one can do and does not do, the powers that he or she leaves undeveloped that should be of greatest concern."

AD CLUB PLANS CONVENTION Will Sponsor Meeting of High School Editors Here.

Miss Eva Johnston, adviser of women, is quoted in the February issue of The Ladies' Home Journal. In an article called, "Our Jazz-Spotted Middle West," by John R. McMahon, dealing with the dance evil, opinions of various college authorities are given. According to Miss Johnston, the University of Missouri has the advantage of isolation not enjoyed by many other large schools, and which therefore adds to its problem.

"We are like a big family here and do not like to discuss in public the details of family affairs," says Miss Johnston. "Yes, we have reports on all dances and chaperons."

"A teacher of dancing might be a good innovation, who does not particularly like the modern dances, but is tolerant and does not think the youngsters half as bad as they often are painted, which figuratively of course, applies more to the girls than the boys."

GRAY FLEET STILL TRAINS Ships and Men Are Kept in Fighting Condition at All Times.

GUANTANAMO, Cuba. (By Mail).—Unheeding the scrap heap prepared for it by the Arms Conference, the Atlantic fleet lies here in the calm blue of the southern ocean, making fit for possible war.

Under command of Admiral Hilary P. Jones, the fleet is now anchored off this port for winter drill and for intensive training of officers and men—undoubtedly the last winter maneuvers this particular group will ever make together.

The battleships Wyoming (flagship of the battleship force), Delaware (doomed ship), Arkansas, and North Dakota (doomed ship), came here ahead of the fleet flagship Columbia, which called at Charleston and Key West for inspection. Along with the battleship force are auxiliaries and train, and eighteen destroyers from Charleston, S. C.
