**MISS MCKINLEY HONORED AT MILITARY BALL**

The gymnasium took on a militaristic air last night when more than three hundred and fifty couples gathered to participate in the annual Military Ball. Members of the cadet corps, former service men, and others interested in the corps were present in uniform. Every division of the service was represented. The decorations were the most elaborate that were ever attempted by the corps. A large dome made of red white and blue crepe paper formed the ceiling for the entire room. Four shaded clusters of lights in each corner, and a large bell-shaped chandelier in the center furnished the only light. In one end of the gymnasium was constructed a platform which was enclosed by flags and bunting. At the rear of this was draped a huge American flag. This platform was used for the presentation of the Honorary Colonel. The orchestra had its place in the center of the room, on a raised platform which was made to resemble a tank. The walls were decorated with patriotic emblems, sabers and flags. Field artillery material was in evidence over the room.

At 8:30 o'clock the firing of salutes welcoming the guests was begun, by a field piece at the side of the gymnasium. These salutes continued until 9:30 o'clock. The music started at 9 o'clock. At 9:30 o'clock Col. Howard Rusk announced that the grand march would begin. It was led by the Honorary Colonel of last year, Miss Catherine Ware, and Col. W. E. Persons, Commandant of the Cadet Corps. When the couples had formed and the line had extended across the full width of the room, the music stopped and the audience was facing the platform at one end where the presentation of the Honorary Colonel was to take place. In the rear, one salute was fired, the flag forming a curtain in the front of the platform was raised, and a huge shell occupied the platform. After a short speech, Colonel Rusk introduced the Honorary Colonel recently elected by the representatives of each company of the cadet corps—Miss Gladys McKinley. At the end of this short introduction, the shell opened and Miss McKinley was formally presented to the corps. She and Colonel Rusk then started the dancing of the Grand March and the Military Ball was on.

The music was furnished by Gene Rodemich's Orchestra of St. Louis. Entertainment consisting of special acts was given between different dances. The first was a dance by Miss Dixie Dunham of Stephens College. Next was

a song by Miss Virginia Rodgers, with music by Miss Jane Rodgers. The quartet of the University Glee Clubs also gave several numbers. Refreshments were served.
