FORMER STUDENT TELLS OF EUROPEAN CONDITIONS

Hugh Schuck, Student in University of London, Touring Germany During Vacation.

"It's cheaper to travel in Germany than to stay at home in London," writes Hugh J. Schuck, a former student in the School of Journalism of the University of London for the last year.

Mr. Schuck left London for Germany March 30, and sent his letter from Treis au der Mosel, a small German village, where he was stationed three years ago. He was the first one of the Fourth Engineers to return to his former billet at the home of the Wustofens, keepers of the village forests.

The attitude of the Germans towards him is extremely cordial, he writes, in fact, they treat him almost like a returned member of the community. Life in the little German village is simple and inexpensive—he was charged 6 cents for a night's lodging and coffee and paid 5 cents for two cups of coffee and doughnuts. The chief source of income in the little community is the vineyards, where both the men and the women work. The mountains behind the town are covered with forests and vineyards, where the vines are in the most hazardous places. The soil is mostly slate rock.

Mr. Schuck expects to be in Germany several weeks. From there he will return to London for the next term's work in the university. He left the United States for London last October.
