TIGERS MADE POOR SHOWING ON SATURDAY

Valley Officials Say Missouri Must Show Improvement in Order to Beat Kansas Aggies.

BUNDSCHU GIVEN ETHER Bunker Is Forced to Quit—Lincoln Does Good Work as Pilot and Gets Place-Kick.

Although showing less snap and punch than in any other game of the season, the Tigers were able to defeat the St. Louis Billikens, a "weak sister," by the narrow margin of 9 to 0, Saturday afternoon at Sportsman's Park. A place-kick from the 22-yard line by Lincoln and a 60-yard run by Smith following a fumble were responsible for the points.

The heavier Missouri line and backfield withstood all of the St. Louis advances, keeping the Billikens more than 40 yards from the Missouri goal during the entire game. The Tigers showed no

VALLEY TEAMS RUN TRUE TO USUAL FORM

Missouri-St. Louis University Game Is Most Surprising Contest of Week—

Of the four Missouri Valley football games Saturday, there was only one upset, although the scores in the other three games were a little different from expectations of Valley critics. Nebraska still leads the conference, running true to form.

St. Louis University showed a reversal of form, using for the first time this year her full team strength and surprised the Valley fans by holding the University of Missouri eleven to nine points at Sportsman's Park in St. Louis. It was expected that the Tiger machine would roll up a much larger score.

The Jayhawk-Kansas Wildcats was the most doubtful game of the week, ending in a 7 to 7 tie. It proved that the Bengals will have a tough proposition on hand next Saturday when they meet the Kansas Aggies. Captain Hahn of the Manhattan team made a sensational 60-yard dash for a touchdown against Kansas University, after intercepting a forward pass, which the latter team was never able to beat although the Jayhawkers were on the offensive during most of the last three quarters. The Aggies were in tight predicaments several times during the game but held K. U. at the critical moments.

The defeat of Oklahoma by Nebraska was expected, but the Sooner's scoring a touchdown in the first period somewhat eased their loss and holding the Huskers to a smaller score than the Tigers did two weeks ago. Nebraska demonstrated again that they are supreme in the forward passing attack, outdoing their opponents who made it their specialty. Nebraska showed everything that could be done on the gridiron against Oklahoma Saturday.
