## NEW COACHES IMPROVE THE TIGER DEFENCE

Bengals Work Late on Rollins Field in Preparation for Game With Pikers.

KERSHAW OFF CRUTCHES  
Washington's Wrecking Crew Arrives in Tigertown Saturday to Rival M. U. Razers.

If a recorder were to make note of everything done on Rollins Field yesterday to prepare the squad for the game with the Pikers tomorrow afternoon, he would not only have run out of writing material but he would have been more tired than the Bengals, who worked without time out from early in the afternoon until after dark.

The Cleveland-Lewis-Garrett-Dunkel coaching staff set itself to work on the Tigers and not one department of the game was overlooked yesterday. The Tigers went through a thorough understanding of what they are supposed to do against the Pikers.

Although no announcement has been made from Rollins Field, it is practically certain that Scannell will pilot the team. He has been doing very well in scrimmages this week and will have his chance to fight against a team from his home city.

The style of play that the Tigers will use tomorrow is unknown to the large groups of students who have been watching the daily practice. The new coaching staff has been spending much time on line plunges, end runs and aerial plays. The major portion of the practice this week has been to drill the Bengals on defensive play more than anything else. The Pikers, who are at the bottom in conference rank, will find it hard to do much against the heavier Bengal team if the latter is playing football.

Kershaw, quarterback, who was injured in the Ames game, jumped off of his crutches yesterday afternoon and announced to the field that he was going to play against Kansas. The doctors took the last piece of cast from Kershaw's leg. Doc Lawler is working on "Red" every day to attempt to get him in condition to play against Kansas, his last game in a Tiger uniform.

Missouri's cross-country team will start its run against the Washington squad between halves of the game. The Tigers are going to meet the Central College squad in a practice run next Saturday.

Tomorrow's game will start at 2:30 o'clock. The bands of Missouri and Washington will parade around the field before the game. Missouri's Razers and Washington's Wrecking Crew will both attempt to carry off first honors as pep organizations, while the Tiger's Thundering Thousand will welcome 500 Piker enthusiasts.

## STIFF CLASHES MARK NEXT TO LAST PROGRAM

End of Football Season Nears With Yale's Struggle Against Princeton a Headliner.

HARVARD PLAYS BROWN  
Ohio State May Give Iowans a Real Surprise and Columbia May Fool Dartmouth.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Football begins to pass out tomorrow with the semi-final card of the 1922 season. It has been a wonderful season, the best in the history of the great game and the end of the road comes not as a welcome event for the millions who now follow the sport.

The next to last program of the year is not an eight or nine star brand like some of its predecessors but there are a number of attractive games on this card: Yale against Princeton.  
Penn State against Pennsylvania.  
Washington and Jefferson against Pittsburgh.

Harvard against Brown.  
Dartmouth against Columbia.  
Syracuse against Colgate.  
Iowa against Ohio State.  
Chicago against Illinois.  
Michigan against Wisconsin.  
California against Nevada.

Not only because it is traditionally the star number of the program, but because it promises to be the bitterest contest of the day, the battle of the Princeton Tiger and the Yale Bull Dog is the outstanding game of the card.

Last year Yale defeated Princeton 13 to 7 and avenged the 20 to 0 defeat the Tigers plastered on them in 1920.

O'Hearn, the brilliant Yale halfback, ran right end for twenty yards in the first period and Mac Aldrich, one of the greatest of all Yale players, added the winning margin with two goals from the field.

Penn State and Pennsylvania come a close second as the best game of the day. Since Penn pulled its surprising defeat of the Navy, the Philadelphians are treated with much more respect. Penn State may not have as spectacular a team as last year's eleven, but they will always be good as long as the Bezek system is used. Most critics agree that Penn State's system is as good as Harvard's and some consider it better.

With the exception of the scoreless tie with California, Pittsburgh gave Washington and Jefferson the hardest game of the season last year with a defeat by

one touchdown. Pittsburgh got away badly this year but they came back strong and are bound to give the Presidents a real fight. There is considerable rivalry between the two clubs.

Harvard will have anything but an easy game against Brown, although the Crimson with the Yale game just one week off may be content to win by a field goal or a single touchdown. Columbia is just the kind of an erratic team to turn around after a miserable season and give Dartmouth a good fight. Colgate under the coaching of Dick Harlow, Hugo Bezek's former lieutenant, has developed into a good eleven and Syracuse will have no cinch to win.

Ohio State hasn't the habit of being anything like a mark for Western Conference eleven and Iowa may get a huge surprise from the Buckeyes' Michigan with Wisconsin and Chicago with Illinois are other good cards on the "Big Ten" program.
