Former Tiger Coach Will Speak to Students at a Mass Meeting Monday Night.

GUEST AT A DINNER Famous Football Mentor Will Not Coach M. U. Tigers While in the City.

W. W. Roper, Princeton football coach, will visit E. Sydney Stephens here next Monday and Tuesday.

Coach Roper is a former Tiger football mentor.

Concerning Mr. Roper's visit, Mr. Stephens today made the following statement:

"When I was in Chicago and attended the Princeton-Chicago football game I met my old friend, Bill Roper, and extended to him an invitation to visit me at his convenience.

"Mr. Roper is coming here as my personal guest. Reports which have been circulated to the effect that he has been employed by the University are unfounded.

"I am sure that everyone in Columbia will be delighted to see Mr. Roper once more, not only on account of the warm feeling they have for him in recognition of his services to this institution, but also on account of the fact that he stands as one of the greatest football coaches in the country."

POLICE FIND CRUDE STILL

Apparatus Made of Wooden Trough, Iron Pipe and Funnel.

The police last night captured a 10-gallon still, rudely made out of a milk can, a wooden trough, an iron pipe and a funnel.
