FREIVOGEL TO WRITE SCORE

Spanish Music to Be Used in Drama, "Blood and Sand."

Edward Freivogel, who composed music for the "Breeze Bug," the "Ninth Deacon" and the "Green Jug," has been selected to prepare music for the drama, "Blood and Sand," which is to be produced by the Harlequin players late in January.

The music is to be of a Spanish nature in keeping with the play, which is a drama of the life of a Spanish bull fighter. Freivogel is preparing dance music for the prologue, a feature to be given by a large cast of Spanish dancers.

NEW USES FOR RADIO FOUND

Discoveries May Stop Future Wars and Cure Baffling Diseases.

By Consolidated Press Assn. (Copyright 1922). SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 16.—Two discoveries in the world of radio, made here during the last few days, promise to be of far-reaching importance to generations of the future.

One of them is the successful transmission of electric power by wireless—which promises to play a part in the making impossible of future wars.

The other is the diagnosing of human ills and the curing of heretofore baffling diseases affecting the inner tissues of the body through the medium of an ordinary radiophone outfit used in conjunction with the electronic theory of reactions.

Experiments in the transmission of electric power by radio already have progressed to the point where forty 120-watt tungsten lamps can be brilliantly lighted at a distance of approximately half a mile and a large electric doorbell can be rung from a sending station several miles away.

Coincidentally the research work in medical diagnosis by radiophone has been carried to a stage where different tone reactions can be secured from each of a score of different internal diseases and the curative possibilities in conjunction with the same discovery have been demonstrated, according to prominent California medical men, in cases of cancer and a supposedly incurable blood disease.

The investigations into the use of the radiophone for medical purposes are being carried on by Dr. Albert Abrams, already known nationally through his efforts to determine parentage of children

through blood tests and as the discoverer of the electronic theory of reactions.

Experiments in radio transmission of electric power and that phase of it which promises to help make future wars impossible have so interested the authorities at Washington that radio engineers at the Mare Island navy yard have been ordered to follow closely and to render possible aid in the investigations. Enough already has been accomplished in the transmission of motive power by aerial routes to insure the opening up of an entirely new era in industry.

The hope of affecting the possibility of war lies in a force for destruction of present day weapons of war. Electric energy can be transmitted by radio to a receiving set concealed within brick, steel or concrete walls and in the process of transmission sufficient heat can be thrown out to make such intervening barriers very hot. No airdials are necessary. Increased to its greater powers, it is believed that sufficient heat can be generated to make white hot a battleship aboard which a receiving set is located or to explode the munitions concealed in a land arsenal or fortification by a terrific heat.

"When we started, our experiments were intended to be solely along commercial lines," says Wallace F. Vail, president of the United States Radio Corporation of San Francisco, which is carrying on the experiments in radio power transmission. "Our engineers have opened a new field, however, which has caused us to lay our results before the War Department and we are now working in closest conjunction with navy radio experts."
