

A NEW ORGANIZATION.

The Liquor Dealers of Butler to Organize a Mutual Aid Association.

There is being organized what is to be called the liquor dealers Mutual Aid Association of Bates county, Missouri, to be located in this city. The object of which association is said to be for the promotion of benevolence and charity, by the establishment of a fund for the relief of the widows and orphans of deceased members. The qualifications are that the applicant be of the age of not less than eighteen or over fifty years, of good moral character, white, and in good health, and must, at the time of filing his application for membership, be engaged in the sale of liquors, either for himself or some other person within twelve months next preceeding the filing of his application. All applications to be in writing. This association will have a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, together with all the paraphernalia usually appertaining to associations of all kinds, whether charitable or otherwise, and we understand that it will be backed and encouraged by some of the heaviest capitalists in the city. The movement is new and novel under the sun. If any such organization exists elsewhere we are not aware of it. Its proposed objects are good. The widows and orphans of liquor dealers, when in need, are as much the objects of charity as the widows and orphans of other persons. Saloon keepers and bar tenders are already excluded from membership in several death benefit institutions in the country and they feel that they are driven to this method of providing for their widows and orphans in case of need after their death. We believe that the association will be fraught with good and ought to prosper.

There will be public exercises given at the eastern school house on Friday evening the 3d day of next month. We give this notice long in advance of the time set in order that parents, guardians and others patronizing that school, and busy trustees, may not be taken by surprise and be prepared to attend on that occasion, and lend aid and encouragement by their presence to both pupils and teachers. We trust to see all the trustees and a large number of patrons present on that evening. To foster and encourage the educational interest is an important duty devolved on us all and we should discharge it promptly. Come out and do your duty now.
