

It is a matter of journalistic record that some years since, a schooner set sail from Baltimore, having on board a crew of thirteen men, by a most singular freak of nature, the entire force was attacked by a skin disease, which manifested itself in large ulcerated sores on arms and hands, wholly incapacitating the men from duty.

RED FIENDS. Forty Persons Massacred by Indians in Arizona—One Man subjected to Terrible Torture—Sad Story of the Sole survivor of a Family of Six.

San Francisco, Cal., April 25.—A Tucson, Arizona, correspondent at Saffords, gives an account of the recent Indian attack as follows: Stamilians Mestas, aged nine years, has just arrived from Stevens' sheep camp with the following story of the Indian massacre of the 16th inst: Before daylight the Indians attacked the camp while we were all asleep. My father and 5 men attempted to get their guns, but too late. The Indians rushed in from all sides and overpowered them before a shot could be fired. The work of slaughter then began. An Indian put the muzzle of his gun against the head of one man and fired, blowing his brains against the floor and walls. I saw them kill my mother and two little brothers by beating their brains out on stones. They killed five. They tied my father and tortured him most dreadfully. We begged them to spare him but they tortured him the more. When they were tired of torturing him one of them split his skull with an ax. An Indian squaw, wife of one of our friendly Apache sheep herders, who worked with us, saved my life by holding me behind her and begging them to spare me. When all of the Americans were dead except me, the Indians left.

A mass meeting was held here, presided over by Governor Tuttle. It was decided to raise a force of volunteers to take the field for two or three months.

The squaw, who arrived with the boy, says the Indians numbered ninety-three warriors in the attacking party. They called themselves Cheerhusians and said they were going straight to San Carlos Agency to kill the whites and get more Indians to join them. They also declared they would kill all of the inhabitants of this valley. The hostiles frequently declared that their whole desire was to kill in retaliation for the death of the three Indians executed recently at Ft. Grant.

Later news from the front is that the whole force of Indians, including women and children, crossed the Southern Pacific track last night near Lordsburg, going south. The cavalry are in close pursuit. The present outbreak is the most disastrous that has ever occurred in Arizona. Not less than forty persons have been killed.

Two companies of cavalry at Fort Point have received orders to be in readiness to go to Arizona, but marching orders are not yet received. Advances are meagre at military headquarters, but the impression is that the force at the front is sufficient to meet the emergency.

Capt. Harrison's company, first cavalry, has left Presidio for Arizona.

Later—A Lordsburg dispatch contains no news of importance from Doubtful Canyon since yesterday's dispatches. Forsythe is reported to be in the canyon, on the east side of Steer's Peak Range, taking things easy and affording the hostiles every facility for escape. It looks very much like a military farce over the Indian question. The troops had the Indians completely surrounded at Doubtful Canyon and Horse-Shoe Canyon Saturday night last, but now it is feared they will escape. An unconfirmed report is prevalent here of two prospectors being killed yesterday fourteen miles north of here, on the Gilla road.

McKinzie is said to be en route to join Forsythe and take command in person.

A new junk stand is now to be seen on the northwest corner of the square.

Charles E. Robinson and wife have sold their lot in the northwest part of the city to Eldridge & Dean for \$500.

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
