Gen. Fitz John Porter has written another letter to the President, asking that his executive power be exercised in removing the disabilities that have been resting over him since the war.

The owner of the house in which Jesse James was killed, a widow, has filed a claim against the state, in the sum of \$2,000 for damage done to property by visitors tearing the house to pieces for mementoes of the outlaw.

A band of Indians called themselves Cheelushaus are on the war-path in Arizona. At the little village Tucson a fearful massacre was enacted on the 16th, and in all probability by this time more depredations have been committed. The military and a party of volunteers are in hot pursuit.

The trial of Mrs. Harper for the killing of her little step-son in Henry county some time ago came up on the second hearing last week, and the jury after being out twenty-four hours failed to agree and were discharged by the court. There again stood seven for acquittal and five for conviction.

Capt. M. A. Fyke, a prominent attorney of Clinton, Henry county, has announced himself a candidate for representative. Capt. Fyke is a young lawyer of ability and best of all, a Democrat of the purest type, and if nominated and elected will make a representative which Henry county as well as the State will feel proud of.

The local columns of the Henry county Democrat are filled up with calls on different parties to run for the digerent county offices to be filled next fall. We would suggest to the hungry office seeker of Henry county to do like the noble men of old Bates, if they want office, just to come out like men, put their names before the people, mount the stump, make a bloody fight, and it successful at the primary, keep right on fighting until the sun goes down on election day in November. This way of waiting till somebody calls on you to become a candidate has long since played out in this country, and it is an old foggy idea anyhow. The best way in the world if you want office is to come out and say so and then if the people want you they will let you know it.

President Arthur continues to grease the fat Readjusters of Virginia. He has just appointed John S. Wise United States district attorney for the Eastern district of that state. Wise is a son of the executioner of old John Brown and has been regarded as a very ultra-Democrat. Mr. R. P. Hughes has been appointed marshal for the same district. The latter is a Republican, and both are Readjusters, otherwise repudiators. Mr. Arthur sees no merit in any man in Virginia who is in favor of paying what Virginia owes. Instead of repudiation being discreditable in the eyes of the Republican administration at Washington, none but repudiators need apply. So far as robbing public creditors by a state can be made respectable the present administration has left nothing undone. And to this complexion has the great moral Republican party come, so far as its president can speak for it.—[Mo. Republican.

We see from the Sedalia Bazzoo, a paper published for the people now on earth, that a muchly married woman is creating quite a sensation in our neighboring town Nevada. It would seem from the article in the Bazzoo, that this charming young woman has a firm grip on the throats of two of her most prominent merchants, father and son. The Bazzoo says she dresses handsomely, takes the world easy, and seems to have plenty. It has been a mystery to the good people of Nevada for some time how this young woman managed to get along so well, as she worked not, neither did she spin, until the wide-awake Bazzoo made it known to them. There were three bills to redistrict the State introduced in the House at Jefferson City Tuesday. Bill No. 1 places Bates county in the twelfth district composed of the following counties: Cass, Bates, Henry, St. Clair, Vernon, Cedar, Barton and Dade. No. 2—also twelfth district—Cass, Henry, Bates, Vernon, Barton, Jasper, Newton and McDonald. No. 3, Cass, Bates, Vernon, Barton, Jasper, Newton, McDonald, Barr, Henry. Either of these districts will give a Democratic majority over a combined vote of the Republicans and Greenbackers.

**WHERE WILL BATES GO.**  
In what district will Bates county be placed in the apportionment, is a question now being asked by many people.

There are so many different plans for redistricting now before Legislative and caucus committees for consideration, that it would be impossible to tell the exact district Bates will be a part of. As there has not yet been a district mapped out at the Capital including this county in the Kansas City district, it would be safe to say, perhaps, that our fortunes will not be cast in that direction.

In all the bills introduced so far, Bates county is in districts with counties lying no further north than Cass and Henry, and no further east than St. Clair, Cedar and Dade. There are really but two plans before the caucus committee at this time: 1st is a district composed of Cass, Bates, Vernon, Barton, Dade, Cedar, St. Clair and Henry; 2d is a district commencing with Cass and running south, taking in the border tier of counties to the Arkansas line, thence including Henry. Either of these plans will give a Democratic majority over all opposition of from 1,000 to 1,400.

It is not fully established that either of these maps will be accepted and reported by the committee without some changes, but it is quite safe to say that no very great change will be made. At all events, we think that Bates county will go into a district composed of counties to the south or east including, however, Cass and Henry, and that it will be reliably Democratic.

The reason why Nevada improves is: Because there is not a more energetic, liberal class of people in the state; because there is no local strife; because there is vast wealth in Vernon county; because her people are intelligent; because it has good schools; because the different church societies are represented and encouraged; because it has the best of market facilities, and because everyone is treated human who locates here. Nevada has a contented class of people, who are willing to make it pleasant for all who will locate in the town.—[Nevada Ledger.

All of the above applies strictly to Butler, and the way we improve will soon make the "Electric City" the largest inland city in the State.

Mr. Allen, of Jackson, being chairman of the committee on congressional apportionment, should urge strenuously that Clay, Jackson, Cass and Bates counties be incorporated in one district. It is the one the people of these counties want, and no other arrangement will be satisfactory.—[Kansas City Times.

As for Bates county being placed in such a district we believe the Times is off in its estimate of her wants. There is but one consideration under which the Democracy of Bates would consent to become a part of the Kansas City district, and that is for the general good of the party. Bates is willing to make concessions if by so doing she can assist a neighbor or further the progress of the party, but she does not desire a repetition of past treatment such as she sustained when a member of the 8th District. Bates county's whole interest, political, commercial and social, lie with her southern or eastern neighbors, and with them we hope to be placed in the new apportionment.

The Texas train robbers have come forth again from their retreat in the Western Mountains. A train on the Texas Pacific was robbed on the night of the 20th, and the gang made their escape as usual. The oldest member of the band appeared not to be over 18 or 20 years old. Strong methods should be adopted against these young bandits that are cropping out over the country.
