Sheriff's Convention.

Jefferson City, Mo. Feb. 6.—A number of the Sheriffs of the State men here to-day to take action upon the bill now pending before the Legislature, regulating Sheriff's fees. About twenty-five were present, and a pleasant meeting was had. Sheriff Wagner, of Cole, was chosen chairman, and Sheriff Howard, of Morgan, secretary.

Only one change in the bill was recommended, allowing five cents mileage in civil as well as criminal cases, and a committee was appointed to lay the same before the Legislature.

The following resolutions were adopted and the meeting adjourned:

WHEREAS, The item of costs in criminal cases, particularly costs for the apprehension of fugitives from justice, is probably the hardest of the State to collect, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, the Sheriffs of Missouri, in convention assembled, call a meeting of all the Sheriffs of the State, and of all the City and Town Marshals of the State, to meet at Sedalia on Wednesday, June 20 1883, in order to perfect a system for the apprehension of criminals, and to organize an association for that purpose.
