

**Hail and Wind in Missouri.**  
 Brownsville, Mo., July 21. A terrific hail and wind storm passed over the section about eight miles below here at 7:30 last evening and the damage to the corn crop was very great as every stalk in its path was stripped. All window panes reached by the storm were broken. The hailstones were so large and fell in such abundance that many were remaining on the ground early this morning. The storm's path was about two miles in width.
