

### Brutal Murder.

Memphis, Tenn., Aug. 21.—News was received to-day of a bloody outrage at Moscow, Miss., a little town forty miles from Memphis. Some time ago Dick Lewis, a desperate white man, was fined \$10 by Gus Steger, the mayor, for an unprovoked assault upon an inoffensive negro. He vowed vengeance on Steger and kept his word. Last Friday Dick Lewis and brother Jim, accompanied by Jim Young, Dick Lawrence and Jim Baldwin, rode into the town and wrecked a saloon, after forcing the barkeeper to give them all the whiskey they wanted. Mayor Steger, who also acts as town marshal, heard of the row and went down to quiet it. When he came up to the rioters they greeted him in a friendly manner so that he was thrown off his guard. They then surrounded him and by a quick movement Dick Lewis sprang upon him and pinioned his arms. As soon as Steger was thus made helpless Jim Young deliberately drew a pistol and shot him in the face. Steger fell and three more bullets were fired into his body by other members of the party. They mounted their horses and fled and at last accounts had not been captured. Steger's wounds are mortal.

### English and American Advertisers.

"It is a mistake," said a well known advertising agent to me recently, "but a common one, to suppose that Americans spend more in advertising than do the business men of other nations. I think Americans spend more wisely and get more display for their money, but the actual sums expended by English advertisers exceed those expended by Americans. One English firm alone spent last year at least \$500,000 in advertising one commodity. Two hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars of this money was disbursed in England and one hundred and fifty thousand of it in this country, the balance elsewhere. They got more display out of the \$150,000 spent here than out of the \$275,000 spent in England. No American firm can equal this record of expenditure, which is not a solitary instance, but will be repeated by the same firm this year and may be for years to come."—Epoch.

Blaine is a leader, but is he a safe one? In his speech at Portland he made a bad break in defending the "trusts." He said "they are largely private affairs with which neither President Cleveland nor any private citizen has any right to interfere." The republican party has not authorized Mr. Blaine to offer this sort of an apology for monopolies. The platform adopted at Chicago says:

We declare our opposition to all combinations of capital organized in trusts, or otherwise to control arbitrarily the condition of trade among our citizens, and we commend to congress and the state legislatures, in their respective jurisdictions, such legislation as will prevent the execution of all schemes to oppose the people by undue charges on their supplies or by unjust rates for the transportation of their products to market.

From this declaration, it will be seen that Mr. Blaine is not preaching orthodox republican doctrine. He is also at variance with the party on its free whisky plank. It may be that the republicans are following the wrong leader, going too much after Blaine and too little after Harrison. Harrison so far seems the more reliable leader. He has involved himself in no way contradictory to his party.

### William B. Sappington Dead.

Marshall, Mo., Aug. 16.—William B. Sappington, one of the oldest and most prominent citizens of Saline county, died at his home near Arrow Rock this morning, aged over 77 years. He was the oldest son of Dr. John Sappington, one of the pioneers of this county, for whom the late Governor John S. Marmaduke was named, and whose memory is revered by the people of this county. ### Bad for the Women Suffragists.

Olympia, W. Ty., Aug. 16.—The supreme court of Washington territory has decided the law granting suffrage to women unconstitutional on the grounds that the legislature exceeded its powers granted by congress, the word "Citizen" in the organic act meaning nothing else than male citizen. The opinion contained 7,000 words, an appeal will be taken to the supreme court of the United States. This is the second law passed by the territorial legislature and the second time the law has been declared unconstitutional. Two years ago an election was held and women cast votes in all the counties. The territory is the stronghold of prohibition and women suffrage advocates, and they will fight this case to the court of last resort.

### Mr. Fish's Bomb-shell.

New York, Aug. 21.—Congressman Ashbel T. Fish of this city has resigned his membership of the republican organization of his district. In his letter of withdrawal he uses these words: "My reason for this resignation is that I am not willing to advocate or support the new doctrines upon which the party managers have decided to make this campaign. I am in favor, as were Garfield, Arthur and Folger, of a reasonable revision of the present tariff in the direction of decreasing the cost of necessities of life and of supplying American workmen with cheaper raw materials for manufacture. I believe that such a revision will increase wages and production in this country and will lighten somewhat the heavy load of poverty and hardship which so many people in our city carry hopelessly from year to year. I am also absolutely opposed to any reduction of tax on whiskey."

An important movement has materialized at Chicago which places the laboring element of that city in line for Cleveland and Palmer. At a recent meeting held there, at which representatives were present from the Union Labor party, the Radical Labor party and the workingmen from the Democratic and Republican parties, economic questions were freely discussed and there was a general unity of opinion that the plan of tariff reduction suggested by President Cleveland and formulated in the Mills bill was in harmony with the interests of the laboring classes and contemplated an amelioration of their condition. One speaker asserted that the outlook at present is that nine-tenths of the labor organizations now formed in Illinois will vote for Cleveland and Palmer. Arrangements were made for holding meetings every Sunday until after the fall elections, and the influence of this movement is regarded with no small degree of apprehension by the republican managers.—Kansas City Star.
