TROOPS ORDERED OUT.

The Government Proposes to Protect Settlers and Their Claims.

Chicago, Ill., March 27.—The thirteenth and fifth infantry and a part of the seventh cavalry will soon be ordered to the Cheyenne and Arapahoe reservations, to clear the squatters off before the throwing open of the reservations for settlement. These squatters have already located upon the choicest portions of the land in anticipation of the president's proclamation allowing whites to settle thereon.

Three years ago when the Oklahoma strip was opened for settlement there was a reign of terror in which men who rushed into that country found it necessary to protect their rights with rifles and revolvers. The government does not intend that there shall be a repetition of this, and troops will be kept at the reservation until the rush is over, in sufficient numbers to protect the rights of all. The troops mentioned are now at Forts Sill, Reno and Supply and can soon march into the land that is threatened with invasion. The office force at army headquarters here is busy filling out requisitions for rations, equipment, etc., in sufficient quantities for a long sojourn in the field. When the land office is opened the infantry will be massed at that point and the cavalry will patrol the border to repel all attempts at lawlessness.

CASS COUNTY IS INDIGNANT.

The Imprisonment of its Three Judges Paralyzed Public Business.

Harrisonville, Mo., March 25.—The imprisonment of the Cass county judges in the Jackson county jail, by order of Judge Phillips, has aroused much indignation among the people of this vicinity. The impression prevails here that much favor is being shown the holders of the bonds, which, it is claimed by the people of Cass county, were illegally issued and for which the county has received not the slightest benefit. An additional cause for indignation is found in the refusal of the bondholders to accept the compromise of 75 cents as voted in perfect faith by the people of Cass county in 1888.

The imprisonment of the judges works a double injury in the fact that all the public business of the county is for the time being suspended and cannot be resumed until Messrs. George, Hain and Wray are released or their successors elected.

For the good of the families of these men and for the good of the people at large it is to be earnestly hoped that something will soon be done looking to a settlement of this vexatious affair whether it be in the light of a compromise or whether the mandate of the court be obeyed.
