Mo State Bank agrees to take county funds until May 1st at same rate as heretofore, when it will be re-let. J. F. Smith appointed justice of the peace of Osage township vice Justice Hogan, deceased. Circuit Clerk Hayes presents statement of fees which was approved. County Clerk Drysdale presents statement of fees and pays over surplus of \$182. Dramshop license granted to W. H. Lynch at Rich Hill.

Gen. Shelby files statement of fees through Weldon Yeats which was approved.

Assessment of Consolidated Tank line reduced to \$5,000.

Assessment of Rich Hill Water & Light Co. divided, two thirds in the city and one-third in township.

Ordered that the court will consider plans and specifications for a new jail and jail residence at the May term.

M. M. Tucker granted school loan of \$300.

C. Hirni, treasurer, made settlement which is approved.

Clerk ordered to apportion telegraph and railroad school monies.

Bridge commissioner ordered to examine bridge in Spruce township.
