### REV. STEWART CONVICTED.

#### The Monmouth Presbytery Finds Him Guilty on Three Counts.

Monmouth, Ill., Oct. 12.—The trial of Rev. J. G. Stewart came to an end at a very early hour this morning, almost an all night session being held. The verdict was guilty the court holding that three of the five charges were proven. The first two counts were not sustained for want of evidence. The charges were:  
1. Claiming to impart Holy Ghost as did the Apostles, by the laying on of hands.  
2. Violating the expressed church authority.  
3. Vain attempt at miraculous healing.  
4. Misrepresentation in his intercourse with the brethren.  
5. Breaking promises.

A housekeeper of St. Louis was one of the witnesses on the stand by the defense. She testified that she had been afflicted with spinal trouble for a period of seven years, and had been convinced by the defendant that her affliction could be healed through the exercise of faith, she finally accepted the doctrine. The result, she declared, was an immediate and permanent cure.

The defense, in his own testimony which consumed many hours in giving, claimed that the miraculous power of healing disease was not only possible in this day, but has been evidenced.

The verdict of the court debars Mr. Stewart from the ministry. He has taken an appeal, however, to the Synod, which meets at Hanover next week. Mr. Stewart is a brother of Rev. D. C. Stewart of the First United Presbyterian church of St. Louis.

#### Outwitting the Indians

Youth's Companion.  
The Western frontiersman often seems to hold in slight esteem the soldiers who are sent for the protection of the border. Having learned Indian methods by many hard knocks, he doubtless fails to exercise proper charity toward those whose experiences have been less extended. His ordinary state of mind may be illustrated by some extracts from "An Historical Rocky Mountain Outpost." An Indian fighter, speaking of newly arrived soldiers, said: "They be the greenest set, and the sight of Injun jest about sears 'em to death. I never saw any of 'em I was afraid of if I had any sort of a show."

"Why, back in '59 I undertook to take a young man back to the states and we started in a buggy; a buggy, do you mind? When we got down the Arkansas spiece we heard the red skins was pretty thick, but we went right on, only keeping more of

a lookout, you know. "But along in the afternoon we saw fifteen or twenty coming for us, and we got ready to give 'em a reception. We had a hard chase, but at last they got pretty sick of the way I handled my rifle, and concluded to let us alone for awhile. They kept watch of us, though, and meant to get square with us that night. "Well, we traveled till dark, stopped just long enough to build a big fire and then lit out. When those Injuns came for us that night we were in some other place, and they lost their grip on that little scalping bee.

"They didn't trouble us any more that's sure. And when we got to the next post there were nigh a hundred teams, six stages and two companies of soldiers, all shiverin' for fear of the Injuns. It rather took wind out of 'em to see us come in with that buggy, and they didn't want to believe we had come through. But we were there, and they couldn't get out of it."

#### "GREEN GOODS."

A Warning to the "Green Goods" Business. The "green goods" business so much talked of in the newspapers, is the preparing and selling of boxes of stuff represented to be counterfeit money, said to be printed from genuine plates stolen from the government. The purchasers are always duped, even in getting an opportunity to violate the law by circulating counterfeit money. The latest item of this kind comes from Oakland, Ill.

"Some time ago Adolphus Jenkins, a prominent farmer, residing north of town, was in receipt of a circular from Toledo, O., offering him a quantity of money said to be printed from stolen government plates, for a small cash outlay. After considerable corresponding Jenkins met the "green goods" man in the Waddell hotel, Toledo, Thursday morning last, and the transferring of \$4,000 in green goods for \$600 in cash transpired. The duped man boarded the Clover Leaf night train for home, and when the train had reached a point near Metcalf, a confederate of the "green goods" man who represented himself as a detective, told Jenkins that he was under arrest for dealing in counterfeit money, but that he would compromise the matter and let him off for \$500. On being told this Jenkins rushed to platform and jumped from the train, which was going at the rate of 45 miles an hour. He received a severe head wound from which it is thought he will die. The package of money contained the usual bundle of brown paper, evenly cut, with genuine dollar bill on top.—Ex.

#### Horrible Punishment Inflicted Upon Mutineers in the Afghan Army.


London, Oct. 7.—A dispatch to the Times from Calcutta says that serious disturbances occurred at Cabul, the capital of Afghanistan, previous to the arrival there of the mission under the command of Sir Mortimer Durand. The assistant commander in chief, it appears, abused a Sepoy of the Heriti regiment, upon which the regiment loaded their rifles and fired a volley killing him. The mutineers fled from Cabul, but were pursued and captured by the ameer's loyal troops. A number were tried by court martial and eleven sentenced to be blown to pieces from field guns, which sentence was promptly carried into effect.

### CONDUCT OF MEN UNDER FIRE.

#### Few Who Are Not Nervous Before The Fighting Begins.

A comrade near me is busily engaged in reading his Testament. This is a peculiarity of his. Just before we were going into the fight before this one, we were marching along, when the advance found the enemy, and skirmishing began. We were drawn up by the side of the road in readiness to go promptly whenever and wherever we might be wanted; and then we waited as the fire grew hot and hotter. As soon as there was a possibility that we might be called upon, I saw him reading his Testament. He reads it now under like circumstances, because he finds some consolation in it and it takes his mind from what is before him. He is a better soldier for this. When the time comes for action he is brave as any one. He knows the danger, but has the courage to face it; and this is his way of keeping up his courage until the excitement of action destroys all thought of danger.

Other men have other ways of doing this. Here is the Captain. He is a little apart from the others; is saying nothing, but is apparently thinking deeply, and is industriously whittling twigs, which he puts into his mouth as if they were tooth picks, throwing one away every moment to put in another one. Here is another comrade who has no desire for conversation; whose thoughts are evidently far away. He is busy picking up twigs and breaking them into bits. Like the Captain, he is keeping his fingers busy as a relief to his his thoughts—as a balm for nervousness. Here is a man whose face is "white as a sheet." He is afraid, but not more so than those around him. He knows that he may be killed at any moment, but is possessed of that higher kind of courage which enables him to go calmly wherever duty calls, or to meet any danger nobly which may lie in the path of duty.

Here is one who shows no sign of anxiety or fear; but he is no more brave than the other. When we first took this position he was very sick, but he is now ready for any duty. The excitement over the dread was too much for him at first and "went to his stomach;" but it is all over. It was only physical, to be sure; but the cause was mental, and the removal of the physical disturbance has relieved the mental cause. This internal disturbance is no uncommon thing under the first excitement of going into battle; and oftentimes in these circumstances the soldier fears that he is going to prove to be a coward; but this feeling overcome, he is brave as he could wish. Another comrade is reading a letter—the

last one he received—and he is well aware that it may be the last one he will receive. Ah, well we know where his thoughts are, and we sympathize with him, for are not all our thoughts on our homes and on our loved ones there?

Every man here understands to the fullest extent the danger he is in, but he is brave enough to remain here, to go farther, if need be, for country and flag; and yet just now his thoughts are with the loved ones; and from many a heart goes up a silent prayer for God's blessing upon them, whatever may happen to him. His thoughts are for their happiness, not for his own welfare. Thus in various ways, do the comrades show their peculiarities under this terrible artillery fire. Some are trying to keep their thoughts busy by conversation, some by joking, some are silently smoking, some are in deep meditation.

#### Sam Jones' Seathing Sermon.

Paris, Texas, Oct. 12.—Rev. Sam Jones, the noted evangelist, preached here "to men only" to night. Fully 10,000 people were present. Never was there such an audience or one so well entertained. He drew startling and realistic pictures and held vies of every character up to the gaze of all. There was laughter and tears. Politicians, Sabbath breakers, gamblers, adulterers and all evil doers were raked fore and aft. City and county officials were denounced in the most withering terms as being in league with the lawless element. He challenged them to deny it and dared any one to try to run him out of town. One man, he said, had even attempted the impossible feat, and he was laid up for repairs and was sorry for being a fool. He warmed everybody's jacket. No man, saint or sinner, Jew or Gentile, escaped the fearful denunciation hurled upon them. No such sermon was ever delivered in this section. Business was suspended and even the saloons closed.

In talking with a lady, the wife of a prominent farmer of this county, last week, we asked her if her husband was farming on as large a scale as usual. She said he was not, as such farming had ceased to pay. She expressed the idea that if we had three farmers where we now have but one, the land would yield better, the expenses would be less and profits greater; the farmers controlled too much money to be really prosperous.—Holden Enterprise.

### All the Woolen Mill Operators of Olneyville, R. I., Resist Reduced Wages.

Providence, R. I., Oct. 9.—A big strike in the woolen mills at Olneyville was inaugurated this morning. Probably 6,000 people are out of work and the strike is growing rapidly. Before it stops, unless all signs fail, every manufacturing establishment in the state will be closed and there is talk of the cotton workers joining in.

There has been discontent ever since a notice was posted in the mill last week of a reduction in wages. Several meetings of the operators was held and speeches of a nature to precipitate a strike were made by labor agitators. It was resolved to wait until this morning when it was understood the scale of prices was to be posted, before taking definite action.

The price list was posted this morning. The weavers in the taft and weeding mills held a convention in the work room, which resulted in their leaving their looms. As soon as the weavers went out a cry was raised: "Let us go to Fletcher's mills" and the crowd all marched to the National Worsted mills. Here they stationed themselves in front shouting, "Come out, come out" and the weavers promptly left their looms.

The strikers then went to the other mills, bringing out the men employed in the mills of Charles Fletcher. The help in the Riverside mills also yielded and every woolen mill closed at noon.

A contest has commenced that will involve the textile workers of New England.


