

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THE INCOME TAX.

The Superintendent of the Income Tax Talks on the Subject.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Ex-Commissioner of Customs Pugh, recently appointed superintendent of the provisional income tax bureau of the revenue department, had a conference with Secretary Carlisle on the subject of the income tax. He was directed to make a thorough investigation as to the best methods to be followed in collecting the revenue from this source, to prepare the necessary regulations, draw up blanks for the returns and all other technical details, which will have to be carefully arranged before January 1. Mr. Pugh said:

An income tax law will always be the subject of some controversy. In its application the present act is full of technical points and it will require complicated machinery to collect the tax. Much difficulty will be experienced in collecting the revenue from this year's income. Many big corporations may not be in shape to really make the returns that will be required, and I apprehend that we will experience much confusion from this source. Then the profit from sales of real estate may give rise to much trouble. The law provides that the profits on real estate purchased within the past two years shall be considered in estimating incomes. Sales may not be recorded promptly and other difficulties may be met with in fixing the dates of purchases and sales. Nor are there the only troubles that may arise from the real estate features of the law. There are many other fine points on other lines which will have to be carefully considered.

The preparation of regulations bearing on the forms in which returns shall be made by individuals as well as corporations, will require much study. The law does not make any provisions as to the form in which returns shall be made to the internal revenue collectors and many important details will have to be arranged to insure against fraud and to secure the prompt collection of the tax. In regard to the time in which the returns shall be made to the collectors of respective districts the act states that they shall be made on or before the day provided for by law, in such form as may be directed by the commissioner of internal revenue.

As the act will affect the income of every big company or corporation in the country, it is possible that the blank returns cannot be made uniform. There are hundreds of details in connection with the collection of this tax, but I hope that before January 1 the work will be in shape to enforce the law promptly.

THE MADAGASCAR FUSS.

The Issue Has Been an Endless Source of Contention to the United States.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—The Madagascar issue has been an endless source of contention to the United States ever since the French protectorate over Madagascar was established in 1885. The first American consul after that was Mr. Campbell, who was in a center of contention between the native government and the French consul-general representing the protectorate. He was succeeded by a colored man of Nebraska, Mr. Walker, whose sympathies appeared to be with the native government, although the state department here wished him to accede to the French claims and take his exequatur from the French consul-general. The present United States consul is an ex-governor of Alabama. He was appointed a year ago, but up to the present time his consular office has not been recognized, owing to the conflict between the Hovas and French governments. It has brought about endless correspondence between the French government and the state department. Private advice received here are to the effect that the closing of the Madagascar ports will be followed by the landing of 2,000 French soldiers in Madagascar.

HEAD CRUSHED IN.

Body Found of a Man Supposed to Have Fallen from a Train.
ST. LOUIS, Oct. 5.—The body of a well-dressed man, supposed to be Thomas Ewing, of Crystal City, Mo., was found under the Iron Mountain railway trestle across the River Des Peres Wednesday afternoon. His head was crushed in, and brains and blood were still oozing out. The body was warm when found, indicating that he had met death only a short time before. It is supposed the man met his death by falling from an Iron Mountain accommodation train bound south, which passed there a half hour before. In the man's coat pocket were two letters, addressed to "Thomas Ewing, Crystal City, Mo.," which were written by "Mrs. Minnie Boyd, of Coffeen, Ill."

The Five Civilized Tribes.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—The census office has issued a bulletin in regard to the five civilized tribes as follows: The population was found to be 178,097, as follows: Indians of the five tribes living in their own tribes, 45,494; other Indians, including many Indians of the five tribes who were found in other tribes than their own, 4,561; total Indians, 50,055; Indian citizen negroes and others of negro descent, 18,696; Chinese, 13; whites, including some claimants of Indian citizenship, 109,333.

Lyman Trumbull a Populist.

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—It was announced that Judge Lyman Trumbull is in sympathy with the populist party, and will deliver an address at one of its mass meetings in Central Music hall next Saturday night. He will address the populists on "The Rights of Man as Affected by Accumulated Wealth and Favored Monopolies." Judge Trumbull has long been regarded as a staunch democrat.

Cut Down the Force.

SIoux CITY, Ia., Oct. 5.—The city council and Mayor Fletcher have come to the point of war over the mayor's effort to drive the gamblers and prostitutes out of the city. The mayor was immovable, and the council has passed a resolution to cut the police force down just one-half. This takes effect October 15 and will leave the city without any adequate protection.

Trying for a New Connection.

SIoux CITY, Ia., Oct. 5.—The Sioux City & Northern road is negotiating with the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern and Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific roads to open a new connection with Chicago and thus enable the Sioux City line to engage in Chicago business.

John W. Goff Indorsed for Mayor.
NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—At the county convention of the state democracy, held in Cooper union, John W. Goff, counsel of the Lexow committee, was indorsed as candidate for mayor.

A NEW TICKET.

The Initiative and Referendum League Files Its Ticket.

A WAR ON JOINTS TO BE MADE.

Kansas Good Templars Want the Prohibitory Law Enforced—Holecomb Recognized—Political Assessments—Anti-Fusion Democrats.

TOPEKA, Kan., Oct. 5.—The Initiative and Referendum league, composed of disgruntled populists, has filed its state ticket with the secretary of state. The Australian ballot law provides that if 500 voters sign a petition requesting that a candidate be placed on the state ticket, it is the duty of the secretary to notify the different county clerks to place the name on the official ballot. No state convention will be held and the nominations are made by filing the petitions. The ticket filed is as follows: W. H. Bennington, Topeka, associate justice; Cyrus Corning, Topeka, governor; M. A. Pratt, Wichita, lieutenant-governor; Alex. Young, Pittsburg, auditor; H. A. White, Augusta, attorney-general; S. T. Cherry, Parsons, treasurer; Fred Anthony, Leavenworth, secretary of state; Mrs. Etta Semple, Ottawa, superintendent.

KANSAS GOOD TEMPLARS.

EMPERIA, Kan., Oct. 5.—A secret meeting was held yesterday morning of the state executive committee of the order of Good Templars, at which it was decided to make bitter war throughout the state of Kansas on all joints and joint-keepers and to demand of Gov. Leveleving that the prohibitory law be enforced in cities where metropolitan police are, and that he remove police commissioners who fail to enforce the law. Rev. J. L. Underwood, of Leavenworth, was given charge of this part of the work, and will be backed by the full power of the order financially and otherwise. It was also decided to start a paper to be the official organ of the order, and George F. Fulwider, of El Dorado, was chosen to conduct it. It is strongly hinted that should Gov. Leveleving fail to comply with the demands of the order it will cost him and his party many votes in November.

HOLECOMB RECOGNIZED.

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 5.—Secretary of State J. C. Allen rendered his decision yesterday at Lincoln on the validity of the state ticket presented by the democratic bolters after the regular democratic convention here September 25. His decision was quite lengthy, but he sustained the regular democratic ticket in every particular, and this ticket with S. A. Holecomb, the populist nominee for governor, at its head, will be placed on the official ballots as the genuine ticket. The other ticket may be placed on the ballot by petition.

POLITICAL ASSESSMENTS IN CALIFORNIA.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 5.—The Chronicle says that all federal employes in San Francisco have received a circular letter from the democratic campaign committee, stating that as officeholders they are presumed to desire the perpetuation of the present administration and that the democratic ticket may be successful. Each officeholder is requested to contribute 2 per cent. of his yearly salary to the funds of the party.

NEBRASKA ANTI-FUSION DEMOCRATS.

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 5.—Through administration democratic circles it was announced last night that a ticket was to be placed in the field by petition representing the views of the so-called anti-fusion democrats. Under the state law 500 signatures are necessary to accomplish this.

STRUCK A TROLLEY CAR.

A Freight Train Crashes Into an Electric Car at St. Louis.
ST. LOUIS, Oct. 5.—As a special west-bound freight on the Wabash road was leaving the city last night it crashed into and demolished a car of the Suburban Electric railway at Union avenue in the western suburbs. The car was struck squarely on the front end and smashed into kindling wood. Of the passengers in the car six were injured. Of these two women and the motorman will probably die. All are badly bruised and cut and suffer broken limbs, and the two women are injured internally. All were removed to the Mulanphy hospital. The blame for the accident has not been located.

BURIED IN A WRECK.

Three Lives Lost in an Accident on the "Frisco Road."
CARTHAGE, Mo., Oct. 5.—An accident on the "Frisco" railway occurred yesterday morning, resulting in the loss of three lives at Smithfield, 18 miles west of Carthage. Freight No. 23, which consisted of seventeen cars of merchandise, was running at high speed and when just beyond the switch the engine jumped the track and was turned over and beneath it was the bodies of Mike Ketchum, engineer; Charles Warren, fireman, and Hummel, brakeman. Six cars were entirely demolished.
