

Race Rights.

Litchfield, Ky., Aug. 29.—The fifth debate of the series between Bradley and Hardin was held yesterday afternoon before the greatest crowd that ever attended a political meeting in Western Kentucky.

Gen. Hardin, the Democratic nominee, appealed to the voters for support because he was opposed to giving the negroes equal rights in hotels, theaters, trains and other public places, and because of his opponent's uncertain stand on the race question.

Mr. Bradley began his speech by deriding Hardin for stooping to the negro cry, and stated that he was opposed to equal rights in hotels and opera houses for the races as it would result in blood being shed.

The next meeting will be held at Eminence on Friday. It will open the fight in Central Kentucky in Mr. Bradley's county, the home of the gold money people, regardless of party affiliations.

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 29.—The police are still looking for James Burnett, who stabbed Theodore B. Gillum to death yesterday. The tragedy is rendered of more moment from the fact that Gillum but an hour before had taken part in a series of tableaux in which he acted a death scene.

The entertainment was given at Slaughter's Grove at Twenty-second and Main streets, by Hebron Council, of the Oriental League. Gillum was taking part for the benefit of the lodge.

Burnett had entered the place without a ticket of admission and become boisterous. Gillum assisted a policeman to eject him. Afterward when Gillum was leaving the place, Burnett stabbed Gillum from behind. The knife severed an artery in the neck.

Gillum was a native of Indianapolis. He had celebrated his 37th birthday the day before he was murdered.

Duelist Romero's Sentence.

Mexico City, Mex., August 25.—Sentence was pronounced this morning on Col. Francisco Romero, the duelist and slayer of Jose Verastigui, chief of the Government Stamp Department. The sentence against Romero calls for imprisonment for three years and four months and a fine of \$1800, or additional imprisonment of 100 days in default of payment. He is to pay the Senora Verastigui, widow of the deceased, or her family, the sum of \$4500 annually for the space of eighteen years; repay to the family \$450 funeral expenses and incidental expenses of the case in the sum of \$418. The well known seconds and physicians who attended the duel were released by the jury from any responsibility and punishment. The feeling against the defendant has been very bitter ever since the duel, a year ago, and the verdict gives general satisfaction. The sentence of Romero is the most severe which was ever pronounced by a Mexican Court against a duelist, and may be considered to be a heavy blow against the future practice of the ethics of the field of honor in this republic.
