### EX-CONFEDERATE REUNION.

Picnic at White's Grove.

Reported by Captain Lotspeich.

Last Saturday the 28th, the Ex-Confederates of this county met and held their first annual reunion under the auspices of Camp Marmaduke U. C. V. By 10:30 quite a large crowd had gathered at White's Grove and were called to order by the commander of the camp, and prayer was offered by the Rev. J. F. Watkins, of the Presbyterian church of this city.

A short address was delivered by C. H. Lotspeich, after which Miss Biddle Catron, sponsor for the Camp, recited the "Buried Banner," which was received with deep emotion depicted upon the faces of the audience. Dinner was then announced—and such a dinner! If any one went away from the ground hungry it was because they would not eat. At 2 p. m. the crowd again assembled around the speakers stand, swelled now to at least one thousand persons and was addressed by Judge James B. Gantt, of Jefferson City. Too much cannot be said in praise of his address. It was plain. No one could mistake the speaker's words. It was manly. He stooped to no mean partisan claptrap or party spirit. It was honest. He spoke from the heart that which seemed to come as though it had been pent up all these years and now burst forth like a volcano. It was loyal. He has been fully reconstructed. He loves the flag of his country and is proud of her history and her institutions. He was heartily endorsed by every Ex-Confederate, and so far as the writer knows, by every other man. It was a red letter day for Camp Marmaduke and gives promise of the larger and better reunion that they will hold next year.

After Judge Gantt had completed his interesting address, Hon. D. A. DeArmond was heartily called for and responded with a splendid talk of twenty minutes that elicited frequent outbursts of applause.

During the day the band discoursed sweet music to an appreciative audience, and all went away happy, feeling that they had enjoyed the day.

### HIS MOTHER'S APPEAL.

Has Saved Clyde Mattox From the Gallows in Kansas.  
Washington, D. C., Oct. 1.—The President has commuted to imprisonment for life the death sentence imposed upon Clyde Mattox of Kansas, who was to have hanged on the 11th inst. This is the case in which the prisoner's mother, after appealing personally to the President, secured a letter assuring her that the death sentence would not be carried out. Mattox was convicted of killing an old colored man, John Mullen, who was seeking to protect two colored girls. He was convicted and sentenced to be hanged in 1891.
