All His Comrades Gone.

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 5.—Notwithstanding that the general public had believed him dead, "Big Foot" Wallace, the most noted Indian fighter that ever lived in Texas, appeared at the Texas state fair to-day.

"Big Foot" lives in a modest home in a remote spot on the Rio Grande about 500 miles from Dallas, and came expressly to see the fair, of which he had heard much during the last 13 years. He had learned that there was to be a Tennessee day, and he hoped that he might meet some of his old comrades of the Texas revolution of 1838, but finds himself alone in that list. "Big Foot" commenced fighting Indians and Mexicans in Texas 64 years ago, and has lived under the Lone Star state's jurisdiction ever since. He is now nearly 83 years old and admits that this may be his last opportunity of witnessing an exhibition of the grandeur of the Texas of to-day and comparing it with the wilderness that existed when he came here.

A J. Sowell, the Texas historian is showing the veteran scout and guide around.

"Big Foot" was enthusiastic when he discussed the state fair and exposition, but said he was disappointed at not meeting some of his chums. This pioneer from Frio county attended the reunion of Tennesseans this morning and the race this afternoon.
