MISS GOULD'S EVANGELIST.

The Power of Old Tom Keenan Converts Many Railroad Men.

From the Chicago Inter-Ocean.

"Tom" Keenan is coming to Illinois. He is on the way now, the old white haired and wrinkled, rough and rugged "Moose of the rails." He is coming to preach to the railroad men. He is coming to "preach the freight" and will send the aged engineer evangelist on a long campaign through Indiana, Illinois, Minnesota and other Western States.

Keenan is a seventy years old man, but full of life in the cause of temperance and religion. Fifty years of his life were spent in the service of the Baltimore, Lake Superior & Western Railroad, nearly all of which time he was an engineer. Now he has given up the throttle for the Bible. Once he was one of the hardest of drinkers. He came in an age of working his life through his love of whiskey. He is absolutely without poison. He had little or no schooling, and he has none of the graces of the orator, but simplicity of his statements, the force of the stories he tells to illustrate his arguments and more than all else, the plain narration of the facts regarding himself, how he came to stop drinking, how he turned to religion, and how he won in the struggle against temptation, appeal more strongly to the men he addresses than the most fervid eloquence of public orators.

It is because of the power the old engineer has among his fellows that Miss Gould has become so deeply interested in his work. Keenan recently made a trip over the Gould system of roads which she planned for him. She not only paid all the expenses, but saw for herself what manner of man he was.

She heard him speak. After the meeting she invited him to supper in her car. He told her the story of his life; how temperance and hard living had kept him back and almost destroyed his home. He told her of the shock he received through the death of one of his boon companions, who died calling wildly on God for mercy at the last. He told of the drunken frolic in which he "swore off" and how he had kept the pledge ever since; of his agony of mind when he crept out by night into the wood yard and uttered the first prayer that ever crossed his lips—"O, Lord, I mean business"—and how at last, as he was driving his engine down a long grade, the sense and certainty of conversion suddenly came to him and his whole life was changed. Miss Gould was so impressed that she at once made arrangements with him to make a tour over the Gould system. As a result of the two months' crusade that has just closed Keenan added 400 men to the list of his converts.

Not content with securing for their charges instruction in jiu jitsu, the Annapolis authorities have secured for them a teacher competent to impart a knowledge of "judo," something of which Westerners have never heard before—something of which jiu jitsu is only a part and the beginning. Possibly this is attempting too much. Jiu jitsu may be only the elements of a higher art, but there is a lot to it, and its acquisition in anything like completeness would take more time than the middies can spare from their mathematics. And we remain doubtful if this generation of them will learn even the elements—let alone the information. How to do many wonderful things will be revealed to them, but they will then be in about the position of a man to whom a prestidigitator has revealed the secrets of his miracles. He understands, but he cannot duplicate until years of practice have trained hand and mind to swiftness and certainty, and he cannot do it then if he lacks a special aptitude for such work.

The Need of a Conference.

Governor Folk of Missouri and Governor Johnson of Minnesota are newly elected reform governors. Governor LaFollette of Wisconsin has already proved himself an anti-monopolist and Governor Cummins of Iowa has shown reform symptoms although the attacks have been intermittent. Now that Governor Deneen of Illinois seems disposed to cast his influence with the reformers, it might be well for these five to call a conference of the governors of the Northern Mississippi valley to take action upon legislation affecting corporations. They might bring over the governors of Indiana, Ohio and Michigan and these eight great agricultural states of the middle west would have a powerful influence if thrown in favor of anti-trust legislation, tariff reform and railroad regulation.—The Commoner.

A Killing At Stroud, Ok.

Stroud, Ok., Jan. 15.—James Borthic, a gambler of this place, was killed about 8 o'clock last night by J. L. McDonald, government blacksmith at the Sac and Fox agency. McDonald came to town yesterday with William Lane, a farmer living near Arlington. Lane drank a good deal in town, and, for fear Lane would be robbed, McDonald attempted to take his money and other valuables from him for safekeeping. Borthic objected and attacked the blacksmith with a six shooter. McDonald shot Borthic twice. Borthic has a family at El Reno, Ok.

Kansas's Coldest Night.

Topeka, Jan. 15.—From the Western Kansas ranges come reports of heavy losses of stock as a result of the cold. The weather to-night is regarded as the coldest of the winter, below zero temperature being recorded in numerous counties.

Reports from the Kansas wheat belt received by leading millers, indicate that the prospects for Kansas wheat were never better. Snow covers the wheat to a depth of four to ten inches, and places the crop in excellent shape for the winter. Practically all the damage resulting from a dry fall has been overcome.

Charge Policeman's Death To Joplin North End Gang.

Joplin, Mo., Jan. 9.—The coroner's jury in the case of Officer Claude Brice, who was shot and instantly killed in Joplin's famous North End one week ago, returned a verdict placing the responsibility for his death on Ed Dailey, a North End bartender; George Rogers, John Franklin, Joe Woodward, El Milligan and Jennie Quinlan, alias Big Jim.

Dailey, Milligan and Jennie Quinlan are under arrest and a man supposed to be Franklin was arrested at Republic, Mo.

Testimony showed that Officer Brice entered a room in the North End a few hours before the killing and found the men plotting a safe-blowing. This was testified to by Milligan. "Big Jim" is held as unnecessary to the fact, because of the alleged shielding of the gang after the shooting.

Fifty or hundred dollars has been raised by public subscription to be given to Officer Brice's widow and orphans.
