Disputed Tax List Lowered.
Carthage, Mo., March 24.—A reduction of \$10,000,000 was made in the Jasper county assessments for 1909 by the county board of equalization. This is a reduction of about 38 1-2 per cent of the land and real estate valuations from the report made by the assessor. If this reduction is approved by the state board the total of real estate and personal assessments will be \$22,394,224, which would be about the same as last year.

TWO NEGROES ARE LYNCHED BY MOB.

Men Work Quietly and Few Persons Knew of Deaths Until Bodies Are Found.

Memphis, Tenn., March.—Charles Richardson and Bob Austin, negroes, were taken from the jail at Marion, Ark., near here, at an early hour Friday and lynched in the jail yard. Few details of the lynching are known beyond the fact that shortly after midnight a party of men met Deputy Sheriff Tom Williford on the street and forced him to give up the keys. Two hours later about fifty men went to the jail, removed Richardson and Austin, and hanged them to a tree in the jail yard. There was no noise or confusion in hanging the men and aside from the members of the mob no one knew of the lynching until daylight when the bodies were found swinging from the tree.

Neither Richardson or Austin was guilty of any serious crime, but confessed to aiding in a jail delivery last Monday in which twelve negroes made their escape. Among the men freed was a negro charged with the murder of T. H. Ferguson, a merchant.

Richardson was confined in the jail on a minor charge and Austin was accused of passing saws and other implements into him.

Officials were unable to identify any of the men who took part in the lynching or in the demonstration, when the two negroes were dragged through the streets at the end of a rope.

It is reported that the Republican congressional committee is sending out under the franking privilege 35 million pamphlets, speeches, etc., for the purpose of bolstering up the political fortunes of the congressmen who have stood by Cannon and Aldrich.

A considerable part of the 35 million documents are to be distributed in Kansas. It is safe to say that in six out of the eight districts the voters will be supplied with an abundance of literature of the stand pat variety during the next three months.

Now, I have no objection to these congressmen sending out all the literature they want to send, but will some person kindly explain why they should be permitted to send out political literature to help themselves in their campaign for re-election, at the expense of the general public?

To distribute the speeches of Joe Cannon and Chauncey Depew and other Aldrich supporters will cost the people of the United States \$350,000 in postage, to say nothing of printing. This is done at a time when the president is demanding that congress raise the postage rates on second class matter in order to make up the deficit in postal receipts. Well, if these congressmen who want to be re-elected will dig up the \$350,000 that it will cost to send out these speeches, that will help some.—T. A. McNeal in Farmers Mail & Breeze.

The bull became mad and rushed Warburton to a tree and before he could find safety in the limbs of the tree the bull had gored him to death. Smith was powerless to help him.

Warburton, who has been working at Sedalia, was here on a visit to his parents at 918 West McCarty street and he and Bert Smith, another railroad man, went up to Elston to spend the day in the country.

The remains of Warburton will be brought to this city for interment. He was about 23 years of age and an employe at the Katy shops in Sedalia.

Of Course They Are Liars.

In the case of the United States vs. the Standard Oil company that is about to be heard in the supreme court of the United States, the Standard Oil attorneys bear down heavily on the point that the Standard has cheapened the price of oil.

That statement has been going over the country now for a long time, and there are some people who believe it who ought to know better. It is true enough that coal oil is cheaper than it was before the Standard Oil company was organized, but if there had been full and free competition, the price would have been lower than it is. Since the passage of the anti-discrimination law, Kansas people have been buying their oil cheaper than the people of other states just because that law made competition in Kansas possible. No trust was ever formed for the purpose of lowering prices to the consumer. Every great combination has been formed with the intent to keep up prices, not to put them down.

The fact that refined oil can be bought cheaper than it could be bought 25 years ago doesn't prove that coal oil, gasoline and other products of petroleum wouldn't be still cheaper than they are if there were active and general competition in the business. If there were active and powerful rivals going after the Standard every day you would see the prices of both coal oil and gasoline lower than they are now, and a good deal lower, too.

Investigation showed that a pistol cartridge had been stepped on, discharged and that the bullet had entered the body of the horse near to and perhaps penetrating the stomach.
