If Dr. H. M. Cannon has a hobby, that hobby is good roads, and it is habitual with him, not to expend his energies in the expounding of theories, but in the practical application thereof. His latest achievement is on north Delaware street, where, under his directions, the block running north from Pine street has been scientifically oiled and transformed into as fine a piece of street as we have in the city. Dr. Cannon describes his method as follows. First, five barrels of a No. 1 road oil were sprayed into a dust mulch, and the street was then dragged. After the surface had become thoroughly saturated with the oil, the steam roller was brought into play and the street rolled until packed hard and smooth. The block now presents the appearance of a finished boulevard and the surface seems as hard and firm as paving. Apparently it will stand the most severe weather and traffic. The 5 barrels of oil cost approximately \$15 which cost will be reduced by a rebate on return of the barrels of about \$1 each.

General Meeting of Road Overseers
The overseers of the various road districts in Bates county met in the Circuit Court rooms in this city Monday afternoon pursuant to the call of County Highway Engineer Jos. Flammang, and proceeded to perfect plans of organization to be put into effect on Good Roads' Days, September 10th and 11th.

\$50 donated to Homer township for building a concrete bridge.
Concrete bridge ordered constructed between sections 5 and 8 Walnut township, provided township give \$100 and citizens do all hauling.
Highway engineer ordered to construct top to bridge between sections 25 and 36 of Mingo township, provided citizens do all the hauling.
Highway engineer ordered to make estimate of bridge over the Hughes branch between sections 6 of Charlotte and section 31 of Elkhart.
