MORELAND NOMINATED.

County Convention Nominated A. C. Moreland County Superintendent of Schools by Acclamation.

Prof. A. C. Moreland of Osage township was nominated for County Superintendent of Public Schools by acclamation by the Democratic convention called for the purpose of nominating a County Superintendent Monday.

The convention convened in the circuit court rooms Monday afternoon and the meeting was called to order by county chairman, Dr. C. A. Lusk. Former circuit clerk T. D. Embree was elected chairman and the democratic press of Bates county, secretary of the convention.

Upon motion, a roll of the townships was called and when Osage was reached, Henry Sheppard in a few well chosen words placed the name of A. C. Moreland before the convention. No other name being presented Mr. Moreland was nominated by acclamation.

Chairman Embree addressed the convention, urging the delegates to see that a full vote was gotten out on election day and cautioning the Democrats against over confidence.

M. A. Kimbrough of Osage township in a short talk stated that the day had never been too stormy or the roads too bad for him to attend an election and vote and work for the success of Democracy and he urged the delegates to make it a personal matter to see that the full vote was cast in each township in the county. Mr. Moreland in a brief talk thanked the convention for the nomination.

Circuit Court.

In the case of the State against Fred Witter, a verdict of not guilty was returned. Witter was charged with stealing 160 sticks of dynamite from the Kansas City Southern railroad.

A. G. Metzler, of Foster, plead guilty to making a false return to the tax assessor and was fined \$500 and costs.

In the case of the State against Harley Imel, of Foster, charged with felonious assault the defendant was found guilty and fined \$100. Judge Calvird granted a stay of execution until the May term of court.

State against George Darnes charged with failing to burn hogs which died from disease on his farm. Defendant convicted and fined \$10 and costs.

Ingersoll vs Bond, change of venue from Cass county, verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$174.02.

CORPSE FOUND IN WHEAT FIELD.

Body of Man Found North of Amsterdam. Death Came by Violence.

The body of a man whose identity remains a mystery was found in a wheat field one-half mile north of Amsterdam between 4 and 5 o'clock Sunday evening.

The condition of the body would indicate that the deceased had met death as a result of violence, and with robbery as the motive.

Coroner Crabtree was notified and a jury summoned which after considering the evidence and viewing the remains returned a verdict that "We find that the deceased came to his death at the hands of parties unknown."

The authorities are of the belief that the man met his death on the railroad right of way and that after being robbed the body was dragged into the wheat field where it was later found.

On January 18th, a bloody coat and overcoat were found on the right of way one-half mile north of Amsterdam and although a careful search was made along the track nothing further was found at the time. There is little doubt now however but that these garments were the property of the dead man. The condition of the body when found would indicate that it had lain in the field for several weeks.

The body is that of a man of about 50 years, 5 feet, 9 inches tall, thin sandy hair, sandy mustache, several teeth missing. A portion of his clothing had been removed. The body had tattoo marks as follows: garland of leaves completely around neck, eagle on left shoulder, woman and snake on left upper arm, woman on right upper arm, snake on left thigh.

Sheriff Johnson received a letter from Mrs. Anna Day of the West 14th Street, Kansas City, Mo., dated January 20th, 1915, in which she stated that she had a man who had been in the field for several weeks.

Troubled Wife Took Poison.

Mrs. Lizzie Fitzpatrick, 50 years old took poison at her home, 615 Spittlog Avenue, Kansas side, early Monday afternoon. Neighbors who found her sent her to the Emergency Hospital where she was still alive at 2 o'clock. In the room was a note addressed to her husband, Edward, who is employed by the Metropolitan.

The note follows:
Dear Ed:—Don't blame me. They won't have me now to tell lies about. I hope they will let you rest. We never stole a dollar. So be good now. I am just almost crazy with troubles. Good by my dear one. We were always happy. Good by. Yours, Lizzie

Another note asked that Mrs. Joe Schaefer, 1048 Sandusky Avenue, a friend, be notified.—Monday's K. C. Star.
