### BIG WHEAT FARM IS SOLD

Tract of 2580 Acres Near St. Charles, Mo., Brings 250,000.

Delavan, Ill., June 11.—A tract of 2580 acres, near St. Charles, Mo., said to be the largest wheat farm in Missouri, has just been sold to William B. Baldwin of Delavan to L. M. Fairbanks of Mansfield, Ill., brother of the former vice president. The price was \$250,000 Baldwin bought the land nineteen years ago for about \$55,000.

Baldwin build a levee nine miles long and varying from 6 to 15 feet high, to protect the farm. Other improvements made it a well-equipped farm. The steady increase in the value of the farm lands has made it a very profitable investment. As part payment Baldwin accepted 555 acres of land in Platt and Iroquois counties, Illinois.

Webb City, Mo., June 10.—Webb City yesterday voted in favor of the return of the licensed saloon by a majority of 644. The total vote was 1435 for saloons, 791 against. Webb City went dry four years ago by 67 majority.
