YOUNG MAN IS ARRESTED

L. C. Bailey Passes Worthless Check. Bail Fixed at \$100

J. Cliff Bailey was arrested by Constable Sorvald and taken before Justice of Peace, Oran Wilson, to answer to the complaint of Mrs. S. B. Carson the boarding house keeper on Broadway, on charge of issuing a worthless check. The check for \$5.00 was on the Student Bank, and was given in part payment of his lodging and board bill, which was \$10. Mr. Bailey has been in the Cape about one month, and formerly worked at the Soda Fountain in Jones Drug Store, and later employed by Thom Bros., as a painter. He states that he expected to make good the deficiency, having some money in the bank, but was laid off this morning, when he reported for work. He then telephoned to Mrs. Carson requesting her to hold the check today, and when informed that it had been cashed by Mr. Cotner, telephoned to him, making a similar request. Mr. Cotner investigated at the bank and found that Bailey had only 50 cents on deposit, and fearing that he would leave town, deemed it advisable to have him arrested. Bond was fixed at \$100 and at the time of going to press, the defendant, accompanied by the Constable were seeking the required bond, in order that he might avoid the humiliation of a jail confinement, until Friday morning at 9 o'clock, when the case was set for hearing.

JAPAN AND RUSSIA TO HAVE WONDERFUL EXHIBITS AT SAN DIEGO EXPOSITION

San Diego, Cal., June 10.—Details of the large Russian and Japanese exhibits definitely arranged for San Diego's great fair of 1915 were announced today by the Panama-California Exposition. Reservations made by the merchants of these two countries are among the largest in the Foreign Arts Building.

Both countries have adopted the San Diego idea of showing processes rather than products exclusively. Consequently, the most notable feature in Japan's exhibit will be the weaving and embroidery of theatre silk costumes for which Japan is famous, the hammering of the bronzes and the labrious carving of wood and ivory. Some of the finer works of art require several years for completion. Different stages of this work and the painstaking methods of the artisans will be shown—in actual process.

In another quarter of the Japanese exhibit will be demonstrated the weaving of the broad brimmed Formosa hats of hemp and chip. The weaving of the silk will be performed by new types of machinery and also in the old style hand process which produces the most extraordinary results.

Similarly, one of the Russian exhibitors, Madame Vera de Blumenthal, will show what the peasant woman of her country can do. Madame Blumenthal has lived in this country for several years, devoting most of her time to aiding her countrywomen in marketing their wares in the United States, obtaining better prices than they had been getting and so enabling them to advance somewhat in the social scale. A percentage of the profit has been set aside as a fund for educating the peasant children, particularly in the Kaustarni arts, with a view to developing the weaving and embroidery work of the Russian peasant into a standard industry.

Until Mme Blumenthal took an active interest in the work the Russian rug was little known in this country, but last year she was invited to send exhibits to various conventions, and the choicest articles won high awards. She is counting on the 1915 demonstration to aid her educational work materially.

A little distance from the peasant rug weavers will be the typical Russian cottage. There peasant girls in their native costumes will serve tea from the samovar in Russian style—just as the Japanese across the building are serving tea in Japanese style.

The cigarette making, glass manufacture, iron working and the other principal Russian arts will be shown, and everywhere will be carried out the program of showing the process of manufacture, allowing the visitor opportunity to see exactly how the goods are made.

CAPE GETS A SHOWER. JACKSON IS SLIGHTED

Freak Rain Visits One Farmer. Then Missed Next—Cloud here Twice.

While Cape Girardeau was getting its shower bath yesterday afternoon, Chaffee and Jackson were sweltering in the sun.

Not a drop of water fell during the afternoon in Chaffee, according to W. W. Gyles, who came to the Cape from that city last night.

"The road was very dusty until we had gone several miles from Chaffee," said Mr. Gyles. "And then when we did find traces of the rain, we were unable to see it fall. It seemed as if we were just a few hundred yards behind the cloud and it never permitted us to get any closer."

Jackson had no rainfall yesterday, although the crops a few miles out of Jackson were greatly benefited by a heavy downpour, which fell intermittently during the afternoon. The rain that visited the Cape came in from the southwest, passed over the city, then turned around and came back, its second visit bringing a heavy rainfall.

While the rain was almost entirely a local affair, it helped crops in this immediate vicinity. But the rain was of the freak variety. It drenched one farm and missed the next one as it flitted lightly across the country.

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MRS. H. L. JONES DIES IN HER YARD

Well Known Cape County Woman is Stricken While Watering Flowers

Mrs. Nellie Jones, one of the best known women in Cape Girardeau County, and a member of an old family in this part of the state, dropped dead yesterday afternoon while watering flowers in her yard at her home in Jackson, Mo.

She had been in excellent health up until the time she was stricken. Her death was almost instantaneous, and due, the physicians state, to organic heart trouble.

Her husband, Mr. H. L. Jones, who has been an invalid for a number of years, was seriously affected by the tragedy, and apprehension is felt for him.

Miss Nellie Jones, a daughter, told a representative of The Tribune last night that she noticed her mother sigh as if going to faint, and then she sat down on the lawn.

Her death occurred a few moments later before members of the family could offer her assistance.

Mrs. Jones was born in Rockport, Ill., and at the time of her death was about 62 years of age. She had lived in Jackson for nearly forty years, having come to that city with her husband, from Chester, Illinois.

She is survived by her husband, H. L. Jones, three sons, Duree, Murray and Harvey C., and two daughters, Misses Nellie and Winnie. She has always figured prominently in religious organizations and was a life long member of the Presbyterian church.

She often spoke of Jackson as it was when she first moved there. She watched the county seat grow from a mere village of a few houses to a hustling little city.

She was greatly devoted to her home and children and at the time of her death most of them were living with her.

Duree Jones, has for years been a partner with his father in the drug firm of H. L. Jones & Son at Jackson, and the two daughters, Nellie and Winnie have been constant companions to their mother.

Harvey C. Jones is engaged in the drug business in this city, and Murray Jones is connected with the Meyer Drug Co., in St. Louis.

Both were communicated with soon after the death occurred, and both have joined the other members of the bereaved family at their old home.

The remains will be buried at the Jackson cemetery this afternoon at four o'clock, and funeral services will be held at the Presbyterian church.
