COUNCIL NAMES SPECIAL OFFICER

Martin Hilpert, Trinity Hall Supt. To Serve—Other Petitions Heard.

Superintendent Martin Hilpert of Trinity Hall, last night was made a Special Policeman without salary from the City by the Mayor and Council on the petition of nearly a score of the members of the congregation of the German Lutheran Church, which owns the Trinity Hall on Pacific street at the head of Themis street.

The appointment was made to empower him to maintain order about the premises of the hall, where he acts as watchman.

Several other petitions were received and read before the City Council last night. Business men in the vicinity of Broadway and Water street, petitioned to have a set of "White Way" lights similar to those on Main and Broadway established at those corners. The petition was signed by twenty-five men and was referred to the Water and Light Committee for a report at the next meeting of the Council.

Councilman Black entered a petition for the City to reimburse him \$21.64 for railroad fare he paid out about a year ago in making trips in connection with the City's complaint before the Missouri Public Service Commission against the local Public Utilities Company.

Black made two trips to Jefferson City to appear before the Commission and one trip to Columbia, Mo., to call upon an expert water analyst. The bill was allowed and a warrant ordered.

Council also ordered all the warrants for City bills and salaries issued.

A petition presented by John King of the T. J. Moss Tie Co., to have an "tax" of 80 cents taxes against that concern stricken out, was referred to the Propositions and Grievances Committee. The tax had been assessed against \$160 worth of ties, which King declared had been moved outside the city limits.

A letter from the Retail Merchants' Association asking the City to repair the wood block pavement was referred to the Street and Wharf Committee.

SEVERE QUAKE IN PANAMA

No Damage Done to Canal, but the Administration Building Is Cracked.

Panama, Feb. 9.—An earthquake shook the canal zone, the shock being the most severe recorded by the official canal seismograph. On a scale of which 10 is the highest, this shock turned the seismograph needle to a point between seven and eight. On this scale the most severe shock registered heretofore left a record of between six and seven.

The quake did no damage to the canal, but it opened several large cracks in the walls of the administration building here, which is on "made" ground.

Wins \$17,425; Sued for Same Amount.

Chicago, Feb. 9.—Ada M. Cox, who obtained a judgment for \$17,425 for breach of promise in a suit against William Rufus Edwards, a St. Paul (Minn.) lumberman, has been sued for that sum by Mrs. Samuel E. Brown. The latter charges Miss Cox with alienating the affections of her husband.

JUDGE KELLY PRESENTS PETITION TO COUNCIL

Circuit Judge Frank Kelly and Attorney Edward L. Drum last night appeared before the City Council to speak in behalf of a petition that was filed by residents on Pacific and Ellis streets in the West End who complained of sewer water backing up into the basements of their homes, because the sanitary sewers were blocked by dirt and gravel allowed to enter the sewer openings in the street.

The petitioners asked that the street or surface water be kept from flowing into the sanitary sewers from their vicinity because the rubbish clogs the pipes and when the water backs into the basements of homes in that neighborhood, it creates a hardship that would be eradicated if the street water were not directed into the sewer pipes.

The petition was signed by Theodore Ochs, Judge Kelly, Charles H. Gelyea and Mrs. Ella W. Rodney.

The Council ordered City Engineer Chris Stiver together with the members of the Street and Wharf Committee, William H. Medley, Charles Armgardt and Walter D. Black, to investigate and ascertain if a remedy may be applied.

CRAWFORD JURY HUNG.

Stand Eight for Acquittal, Four for Conviction in Robbery Trial.

The jury before whom Herman Crawford was tried in the Circuit Court at Jackson on a charge of burglary, yesterday was dismissed by Judge Kelly after they were unable to reach a verdict.

The jurors were dismissed at 10:30 o'clock in the morning after they had received the case about 4:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon and spent the night locked up under the sheriff's care.

The vote in the jury room stood eight for acquittal and four for conviction. Crawford, a negro who was charged in warrants with the robbery of the Will Hirsch store in Haarg several weeks ago almost simultaneous with the robbery of the Wasem drug store. Clothing valued at several hundred dollars was taken from the store, entrance having been effected through a window that was pried open.

Several witnesses were taken from the City Jail in the Cape to testify at

the trial and during the course of the trial, Attorney R. H. Whitelaw, counsel for the negro, placed the defendant upon the witness stand. He made a denial of the charge against him.

J. Henry Caruthers declared he will ask a new trial.

TWO SUITS IN COMMON PLEAS.

Two new suits were filed in the Common Pleas Court yesterday on next to the last day before the close of the filing date before the February term of court. Cases will be received tomorrow.

The W. C. Hager Iron Company yesterday filed a suit against the R. P. Feldhoff, Cape Foundry & Machine Shop, seeking to recover \$140.34 alleged to be due on a bill. The suit was filed by Judge Edward D. Hays.

The Union Lumber and Manufacturing Company also filed a suit against J. F. Fuerth seeking to recover \$313.65 on a bill alleged to be due. This suit was filed by Caruthers and Barks.

Prosecuting Attorney J. Henry Caruthers, yesterday spent the day in Jackson, attending the session of the County Court.

KAISER'S SON WOUNDED.

Berlin, Feb. 7.—It was officially announced here today that Prince Oscar of Prussia, the Kaiser's fifth son, had been slightly wounded in the head and in the upper part of one thigh by shell splinters. Prince Oscar's wounds were received on the battlefields in the eastern theater of war. He was not seriously wounded, the official announcement says, but he will be compelled to remain in doors for several weeks.
