NOTICE OF PRECAUTIONARY MEASURES ADOPTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE PREVENTION OF AN EPIDEMIC OF INFLUENZA.

Upon recommendation of the Board of Health, approved by the Mayor and Council of the City of Cape Girardeau, Missouri, an emergency condition is declared to exist, endangering the health of the community, by reason of the appearance of an infectious m'ady known as Spanish Influenza.

And in order to avert an epidemic of said sickness and to prevent its spread to other localities, it is hereby ordered, by authority and direction of the Mayor and Council of the City of Cape Girardeau, Missouri, that from and including Friday, October 11, 1918, to Monday, October 21, 1918, it will be necessary to suspend or close every institution in said city operated or maintained through assemblage or gatherings of people for protracted periods, which order includes the following:

Theaters, Churches, Conventions, Schools, and all indoor public gatherings of whatsoever kind or character, including social functions and public weddings.

In addition to the above order, it is further directed that all pool rooms in the city, for the period mentioned, close their doors and suspend business at 8 o'clock, P. M., each day, until the opening hour on the following morning.

Schools and other businesses are also directed to prevent as far as possible the continued assemblage of patrons about their premises by denying them the right to loiter after their needs have been supplied.

GEORGE HAMPTON IS STRICKEN SUDDENLY

Ancient Drayman, Veteran of Civil War, Victim of Heart Failure, Tuesday

George Hampton, an aged colored drayman, who lived at 230 South Middle street, just north of Judge Wilday morning. He was in the act of entering the election precinct on Good Hope street to vote when he fell unconscious. He was carried to his home, where he expired a few minutes later.

Relatives of Hampton say he was about 95 years old. He was born in the state of Mississippi but has lived in Cape Girardeau a long time and conducted a dray many years. He was married to his wife, who survives him, 52 years ago on the 2nd of April. They had no children.

Hampton served in the army during the civil war for more than three years and drew a pension from the government. A sister of his is living in Greenville, Miss. She was reached by long distance telephone Wednesday and notified of Hampton's death.

The aged man was a familiar figure in the city for years and had the respect of all who knew him. He was one of the anti-billium Uncle Tom Cabin type.

BOND EXCHANGE TO EXPIRE SATURDAY

Converted Liberty Firsts And Seconds At 4 Per Cent Will Be Taken For 41-2

Washington, Nov. 2—Owners of first Liberty bonds converted, and second Liberty bonds, bearing 4 per cent who wish to exchange them for bonds bearing 4 1/2 per cent must do so before next Saturday, Nov. 9, when the conversion privilege by law expires. This can be done without cost at any bank and the only effect is to give the bondholder an extra quarter of a percent interest, which amounts to 25 cents per year on the \$100 bond. Third loan bonds are not to be converted because they already bear this amount.
