County Court Proceedings.

Warrant for \$10.00 is ordered issued to Rose Campbell for relief.

E. L. Slinkard is granted a loan of \$1050.00 from the school funds of the county upon complying with the law in such cases.

Cyrus H. Smith of Daisy is ordered admitted to State Hospital No. 4 at Farmington as a county patient, and also Elizabeth Stoval of near Whitewater.

In reprobation of Mathilda Busch for quit claim deed. Now comes Fred H. Schrader, who was appointed on February 9th, 1912, by this court as commissioner to execute a quit claim deed to Mathilda Busch and reports that he this day executed said deed to the above named party as by the order of this Court directed, to the following real estate: all of the northeast quarter of the northwest quarter of section 27, township 31, range 13 east, containing 40 acres, which deed is presented in open Court, approved and said commissioner is therefore relieved of further duty as such commissioner.

Proposals of the banks of Cape Girardeau county were presented offering to sell court house and jail bonds, being from the Sturdivant Bank which offered to take \$4892.50 for \$5000.00 of the bonds, offer accepted and warrant for above amount was drawn on Sinking and Interest fund in their favor; offer of Cape County Savings bank and the Peoples National bank for par and interest for same bonds accepted and six more bonds taken up, warrants ordered drawn in favor of Savings bank for \$2000.00 and the Peoples National bank for \$1000.00, thereby paying off \$8000.00 of said bonds.

R. E. Vangilder is appointed road overseer of district No. 9. William Feuerhahn for district No. 18, W. P. Wilkinson for district No. 13, and J. H. Young for district No. 3, instead for others who refused to serve.

The County Collector presents a list of erroneous and double assessments for taxes of 1911 which was ordered stricken off by the Court and the collector is allowed credit for same.

G. W. Sharp is granted a loan of \$1000 from the school funds upon compliance with law in such cases.

S. M. Penney is granted a license as dramshop keeper at Dutchtown.

J. Frank Caldwell, collector of the revenue, presents land delinquent list showing taxes remaining due and unpaid for 1911, as follows: State tax, \$713.73; County, \$1258.44; Road, \$184.19; R. R. A FREAK OF NATURE.

The Curious Vegetable Caterpillar of New Zealand.

Among the many strange growths apparently freaks of nature, which are to be found in New Zealand the vegetable caterpillar readily ranks among the foremost. This caterpillar is several inches in length, is hairless and does not differ essentially in appearance from some of the caterpillars of our own land.

Its claim to distinction lies in the fact that when it gets ready to die it digs a hole for itself in the earth and completely buries itself. Later a slender green shoot springs from the spot. This bears two or more leaves near its top.

Upon investigation it is found that the green shoot springs from the head of the dead caterpillar, and further investigation develops the fact that the body of the caterpillar is filled with roots.

The form is retained without change, and the roots do not pierce through the skin or enter the ground. When dug up this dead yet living freak presents a most odd appearance, for the head and even the eyes of the caterpillar are distinctly seen, yet from the head is growing the green sprout, with its leaves.
