M. W. of A. 30 YEARS OLD.

World's Largest Fraternal Beneficiary Society Celebrates Anniversary of Its Birth on January 5th, Next.

The Modern Woodmen of America, the largest fraternal beneficiary society in the world, will be 30 years old on Jan. 5, 1913. The first local camp, or lodge of the Society was organized on Jan. 5, 1883, at Lyons, now a part of Clinton, Iowa, with 21 charter members. This Camp, which is named "Pioneer Camp No. 1," is still in existence, with 381 members.

The latest membership statement issued by the Society discloses that it has a beneficial membership of 1,035,029, and a Social, or uninsured, membership of 24,510. The Beneficial members carry insurances aggregating \$1,650,337,500, and these members are affiliated with over 15,000 local Camps, scattered throughout the United States and Canadian provinces.

The original jurisdiction of the Society was limited to the states of Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, the two Dakotas, and Nebraska; but the Society is now doing business in every state of the United States, with the exception of two, and in the four western provinces of Canada.

To date the Society has paid the enormous total of \$115,813,855.56 in benefits to the beneficiaries of 65,468 deceased members, an average payment of \$1,769 for each claim allowed.

Local Camps of the Society throughout the jurisdiction are making arrangements to celebrate the Society's anniversary with appropriate ceremonies.

Testing Grain With Testing Kettle.

Inquiries have come to the Missouri State Board of Agriculture as to the proper method of testing grain with a testing kettle such as is commonly used at elevators. The rule is as follows: "Place the kettle where it cannot be jarred or shaken. Pour from a scoop, bag or pan, held two inches from the top of the kettle, into the middle of the kettle at a moderate speed until running over. Strike off in a zigzag manner with the edge of the beam held horizontally."

For Missouri Farm Women.

Miss Nellie Nesbitt, a graduate from the Home Economics Department of the University of Missouri, and who has had experience in the teaching of Home Economics, besides giving much thought and study to the problems of the home, and especially of the farm home, has recently been employed by the Missouri State Board of Agriculture. Miss Nesbitt will devote her entire time to institute an organization work. She hopes to do for the farm women of Missouri what S. N. Jordon, J. K. Wright and others employed by the Board of Agriculture, have done and are doing in their work with the men on the farms. Communities desiring the services of Miss Nesbitt should communicate with the secretary of the Missouri State Board of Agriculture at Columbia.

Negroes Hold a Fair.

A fair and farmers' institute, managed and conducted entirely by negroes, was recently held at Bunceon, in Cooper county. This was the second meeting of the kind held by the association and like the first was a decided success. The entries of farm and garden products and kitchen and pantry stores would have done credit to an ordinary county fair. Believing that the best opportunity for the negroes is in the country, the Missouri State Board of Agriculture sent to this meeting as a special lecturer and demonstrator, Henry Kirklia, a successful negro gardener from Columbia. The association has elected officers and will hold another fair and farmers' institute next year.

Missouri Has Many Named Farms.

It is said that there are more named farms in Missouri than in any other state in the Union. This is probably due to the fact that Missouri was the first state to have a farm name registration law, the passage of which was secured by W. L. Nelson, present assistant secretary of the Missouri State Board of Agriculture.
