ORDER OF SALE UNDER SCHOOL FUND MORTGAGE.

Whereas, on the first day of Dec. 1893, Isaac J. Stout and Martha J. Stout, his wife, borrowed of the county of Cape Girardeau the sum of seven hundred dollars belonging to the capital school funds of said county, to-wit: The capital of the county school fund the sum of \$370 and the following school township as in said county: Township No 6, \$40; township No 7, \$300; and whereas, in consideration of said premises, and to secure the payment of said sums of money when the same should become due, on the first day of December, 1894, the said Isaac J. 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

Herr Zeller, head of the Bureau of International Statistics at Stuttgart, has published an interesting table of the religions of the world. Arrangements are already being made for the attendance of 100,000 Salvationists from all parts of the world. An Atlantic liner is to be chartered to take 500 Salvationists from America. The congress will take the place of the ordinary triennial congress and exhibition of the Salvation Army.
