We do not think it wise to spend much time on a fellow who says we are "agin" the court house proposition, and assigns no reason.

THERE is no voting for principle involved in the court house proposition. It is simply a matter of public improvement or no public improvement.

THE court house proposition must carry. If it should fail, Cape Girardeau need boast no more of being the banner county of Southeast Missouri.

We should like to hear a voter who opposes the court house offer any good reason. To our minds none but a prejudiced, envious person would vote against it.

LET every voter who is in favor of the new court house be at the polls early and vote, and then if need be stay there and show the opposers the error of their way.

LET every worker who is in favor of the court house proposition get out and hustle. We have everything to gain and nothing to lose. It is bound to carry.

THAT we need a differently arranged court house was decided four years ago, when about 1500 voters said we needed it. Vote yes on the proposition on Aug. 26.

ON the 26th every voter who believes in public improvements, who desires Cape county to have as good a court house as any other county in the state will vote yes on the proposition.

A NEW court house is needed to preserve the records, to give a room for each county officer, to beautify our county and cause new life to be added to our city, hence our enterprising, thinking men will vote for the proposition.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION.

State of Missouri, County of Cape Girardeau, ss. May Term, 1905. In the County Court of said County, on the fourth day of May, 1905, the following, among other proceedings, were had, viz: Now, at this time, it being the regular May term, 1905, of the County Court of Cape Girardeau County, Missouri, is presented a petition signed by more than 1000 qualified voters of said county, who are taxpayers therein, praying the Court to order a special election to be held in said county not earlier than August 20, 1905, nor later than September 10, 1905, submitting to the qualified voters the proposition to issue bonds for the sum of \$75000.00, bearing interest at such rate and running for such time as the court may deem proper, for the purpose of raising the necessary funds to build a new court house and jail at the county seat and to acquire such real estate adjacent to the public square as may, in the judgment of the County Court, be needful for that purpose.

And the Court having examined said petition and being now fully advised in the premises, doth therefore order and direct that a special election be held at the usual places of voting in the several voting precincts of Cape Girardeau County, Missouri, on Saturday, the 26th day of August, 1905, for the purpose of voting upon the proposition to issue bonds in the name of the county for the sum of \$75000.00 to raise the necessary funds to build a new court house and jail at the county seat and to acquire such real estate adjacent to the public square as may be needful for that purpose. Such bonds to be payable 20 years after the date of their issue, but redeemable at the option of the County after ten years from their date, and bearing interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum payable annually.

And it is further ordered by the Court that for the purpose of creating a sinking fund to pay off said bonds and the interest thereon when the same shall become due, a tax of five (5) cents on the one hundred dollars assessed valuation be levied on all property taxable in Cape Girardeau County, Missouri, for State and County purposes.

And it is further ordered that at said special election all who favor said proposition to issue bonds in the name of the county shall have printed or written on their ballots: "Appropriation of \$75000.00 for the purpose of building a new court house and new jail and acquiring such real estate as may be needful for that purpose adjoining the public square in the City of Jackson, Cape Girardeau County, Missouri.—Yes." And all those who are opposed to said proposition to issue bonds in the name of the county shall have printed or written on their ballots: "Appropriation of \$75000.00 for the purpose of building a new court house and new jail and acquiring such real estate as may be needful for that purpose adjoining the public square in the City of Jackson, Cape Girardeau County, Missouri.—No."

And it is further ordered by the court that notice of said special election be given by the Clerk of this Court at least twenty days prior to the day of such election by publication in the Cape Girardeau Republican, Cape Girardeau Progress, Cape Girardeau Democrat, Missouri Cash-Book, JACKSON HERALD and Deutscher Volksfreund, all newspapers published in Cape Girardeau County, Missouri, and that said notice be in words and figures as follows:

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of an order made by the County Court of Cape Girardeau County, Missouri, at its regular May Term, 1905, a special election will be held at the usual voting places in the various precincts in said County on Saturday, the 26th day of August, 1905, to vote upon a proposition to issue bonds on behalf of said County in the sum of \$75000.00 for the purpose of erecting a new court house and jail at the county seat of said county and acquiring such real estate adjacent to the public square as in the judgment of the County Court may be needful for that purpose. Such bonds to be payable in twenty years from their date, but redeemable after ten years at the option of the four per cent. per annum payable annually. And also to levy a tax of five (5) cents on the one hundred dollars assessed valuation of the property subject to taxation in said County for State and County purposes to create a fund for the payment of said bonds and interest.

New Court House.

At one time, about thirty-five years ago, Cape Girardeau county was considered the best county in Southeast Missouri. Yes, within 150 miles west of the Mississippi river. It had no railroads then; nothing but the great Father of Waters, the Mississippi. It then, too, had the best court house of any of the counties within the territory above mentioned. Since then a number of its sister counties have come to the front, and as they come to the front they also built good court houses, so that now this county is no more in the front rank when the court house is considered. In this respect a number of counties have far out-ranked this county, while in other respects this county has kept on with its onward pace; it has railroads that lead in all directions. Now would it not be the proper thing for the county to have a court house that would be in keeping with all other improvements and one that would place the county in the front again where it properly belongs. The present court house, while to all appearances is a good and substantial building, is not what the county needs; it is entirely too small to transact the business of the county at the present time, to say nothing of the future. There is not sufficient room to store the books the county now has. What shall be done with those that are yearly added? It must be borne in mind that, on account of the rapid growth of the county, more books now accumulate in the course of five years than formerly accumulated in twenty years. What will you do? The only solution is—get a building that will be amply large to hold all the books and records of the past, of the present and of the future for years to come. Get something that will be safe and in which these books can be preserved, because they are valuable, worth more money than ten court houses are worth. There is a proposition before the voters, such as cannot be offered by any county in the state, and that is to build a court house without any additional cost to the taxpayers. Therefore, we appeal to our citizens. Think over this proposition in all of its details and if you do give it that careful consideration which it deserves, we feel sure that you will come to the conclusion that it is a new court house that the county needs and you will, on the 26th day of August, go to the polls and cast your vote in favor of the proposition to build a new court house.
