CHILD'S BLOOMERS AND UNDERWAIST.



Patterns Nos. 5120 and 5124.—The bloomers shown in the above design have become a very popular garment with children of both sexes. They are made of the same material as the dress and take the place of petticoats. The pattern is in one piece, circular in shape and with no fullness around the waist, a feature that would recommend it especially if heavy material is used in the making. The underwaist is a very simple pattern to follow, fitted by shoulder and underarm seams and the neck and armholes finished with a narrow frill of embroidery. The pattern provides for long sleeves which may be used if desired. The materials most in use are muslin, longcloth and Canton flannel. The medium size requires seven-eighths of a yard of 36-inch material for the waist and 1 1/4 yards for the bloomers. Child's Underwaist: Sizes for 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 years. Child's Bloomers: Sizes for 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 years. The above illustration calls for two separate patterns.

**POLITE TO THE GIRLS**

MALE STUDENTS OF YALE ON THEIR GOOD BEHAVIOR.

Manifest No Displeasure at Having to Study with Young Women—Cupid Is Not Busy at Present.

The Yale students are more polite than the Harvard students, at least that is what the 25 or so Yale co-eds say, reports the New York Sun. Although the Yale men did not grow enthusiastic when it was announced a few years ago that Yale was going to follow the example of the Cambridge university and allow the women to study with them, at least in the graduate school, they didn't make any violent objection to the plan, and started in at once to take the change as pleasantly as possible. Now they have grown accustomed to reciting before an occasional schoolmate or a young college alumna, and apparently they are more at ease than the young women themselves.

"The Yale men, even if they don't like us around," said one of the girl students of the graduate school, "are too polite to show it, at any rate, and in that they are one ahead of the Harvard students. They don't like us in the class room up there, and they are not so careful to hide their preferences," she laughingly added.

The young women who come here generally are interested only in their work, and are not looking for any social features incidental to college life. Thus one young woman who graduated from Mount Holyoke college in 1906 and is taking work in economics here is studying sociological problems by living at a mission hall.

There she has an opportunity to study practical problems in sociology. She lives among the people whom she is studying, and her daily round of pleasure or work, when not on the Yale campus, is among the foreigners in that part of the city.

But although the Yale co-eds don't mingle much socially with the Yale undergraduates or the graduate students or young professors, they have their own club. "No men allowed," is the club's motto. Some of the club members do a good deal of their studying and writing there, while others only go there at rare intervals for recreation.

In the last winter the co-eds have held some social affairs away from the club; generally at the boarding houses where the young women live. Occasionally the wife of a young professor has been invited to one of these gatherings, but she was always obliged to leave her husband at home, for the motto of the club has been strictly enforced at these gatherings.

The men students, on the contrary, welcome their associates among the young women at their classical, mathematical and other clubs here, and frequently the paper of the evening is read by one of the co-eds. These clubs are, however, societies for research, and the members are interested more in the intellectual side of the affair than the social.

Although Cupid can hardly be said to do a land office business among the Yale co-eds, a romance is sometimes the result of study here at the graduate school. Last year two of the members of the school surprised their friends and even the instructors under whom they had worked together by sending out wedding announcement cards just about commencement time when both were taking a degree. They are teaching together this year in a school in Texas.


