## ORDINANCE NO. 270.

An ordinance in relation to compensation of city officers: Fees of the mayor and salary, Section 1; salary of the city clerk, Section 2; salary of the city treasurer, Section 3; pay of city collector, Section 4; pay of the city marshal, Section 5; pay of the city attorney, section 6; compensation of the city assessor, Section 7; pay of the street commissioner, Section 8; pay of the board of aldermen, Section 9.

Be it ordained by the board of aldermen of the City of Jackson as follows:

Section 1.—Fees of the mayor and salary: The mayor shall be allowed as a salary for his services thirty-seven dollars and fifty cents per annum and the following fees in the mayor's court: For administering every oath 5 cents; for certificate of affidavit, 15 cents; for every subpoena issued, 25 cents; for every summons or warrant 35 cents; for entering judgment in any case, 50 cents; for issuing attachment for witness, 75 cents; for making a copy of record, for every 100 words and figures, 10 cents; for issuing venire for jury, 35 cents; for docketing each case, \$1; for indexing each case, 10 cents; for taking each recognizance, 35 cents; for entering continuance in each case, 35 cents; for taking affidavit for appeal, 35 cents; for any rule or order not hereinbefore stated, 25 cents; for swearing jury, 25 cents.

Sec. 2.—Pay of the city clerk: The city clerk shall receive for his services to the city the following fees, to-wit: For every license issued, the sum of 50 cents; to be paid by the applicant at the time of issuing the license; for keeping and recording the minutes of the meetings of the board of aldermen and for attending each meeting the sum of 50 cents, and 10 cents for each 100 words and figures for keeping and recording the minutes of the meetings; for recording city ordinances, 10 cents for every 100 words and figures; for issuing warrants, 5 cents; for making out the city tax book, each year 10 cents per hundred words and figures; for keeping the record of the sale of lots in the city cemetery, 25 cents for each lot sold and entered on the record, to be paid by the purchaser; for keeping the accounts of the city, with the city collector, city treasurer and such other accounts as may be required to be kept by the city, \$5 per annum; for copies of record, papers, etc., 10 cents for every 100 words and figures; for filing each petition, bond, or other paper, 5 cents; for each certificate, 25 cents; and for all other services required by law, ordinances or resolutions, such compensation as may be allowed by the board of aldermen.

Section 3.—Pay of the city treasurer: The city treasurer shall receive for his services the sum of \$50 per annum.

Sec. 4.—Pay of the city collector: The city collector shall receive for his services four per cent of all the revenue he collects.

Sec. 5.—Pay of the city marshal: The city marshal shall receive for his services the sum of \$50 per month and for serving process, warrants, subpoenas, etc., such fees as allowed constables for like services.

Sec. 6.—Pay of the city attorney: The city attorney shall receive a yearly salary of one hundred dollars, payable quarterly, at the end of each quarter, and the sum of two dollars as a fee in all cases in the mayor's court, where the defendant is convicted or pleads guilty, to be taxed as costs. The salary provided for herein shall be in full compensation for all services rendered to the city by the city attorney. In any case where special compensation other than the foregoing is intended, or expected to be charged for, he shall before doing the work procure a special order from the board of aldermen for the doing for such work and the amount of special compensation shall be provided for in the order, otherwise the said salary and fees in the mayor's court shall be in his full compensation for all his services.

Sec. 7.—Pay of the city assessor. The city assessor shall receive fifteen cents per assessment list as his full compensation for listing taxpayers and

preparing his land and personal assessment books.

Sec. 8.—Pay of street commissioner: The street commissioner shall receive for his services the sum of one dollar and fifty cents for each day actually employed in the discharge of his duties as commissioner.

Sec. 9.—Members of the board of aldermen shall be paid one dollar for every meeting of the city council which they may attend. Provided, that such compensation shall not exceed twenty dollars per year. The city council shall have power to allow members of special and standing committees a reasonable compensation for such services, not to exceed one dollar and fifty cents per day for time actually employed in discharging such committee work.

Sec. 10.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 11.—This ordinance

shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
