The machine is so constructed that it may be attached to any pump, just as it is in any well; the only change being necessary is the piping to the trough or tank, connected to which is the float and automatic regulation device.

A cut sent to us from the company shows the machine in operation.

In order to introduce the invention as quickly as possible the company says it has adopted the plan of appointing local agents in each county in the state, giving exclusive rights to those who will devote their entire time to the sale of the machines. In this way they hope to realize quicker returns for the stockholders, as well as to give profitable employment to a large number of energetic men throughout the state. So confident are they of success that they propose to place the machines out on thirty days' free trial before any payment is made. They do not ask any bonus whatever from us to locate the factory here, but they will give our citizens an opportunity to subscribe for some of their stock, if after a thorough investigation, they are satisfied it will be a paying investment.

### ORDINANCE NO. 276.

An ordinance in Relation to City Attorney.

Qualification and oath of city attorney: Section 1.  
Duties: Section 2.  
Vacancy: Section 3.

Be it ordained by the board of aldermen of the City of Jackson as follows:

Section 1. Qualification and Oath—The person receiving the appointment as City Attorney must be twenty-one years of age, a resident of the city of Jackson, and before entering upon his duties of office shall take and subscribe the oath prescribed by Section 5917 of the revised statutes of Missouri. The mayor with the consent and approval of a majority of the members

elected to the Board of Aldermen, shall appoint a City Attorney who shall possess the qualifications mentioned in this section, and shall be learned in the law; and such appointee shall hold his office for a period of two years and until his successor is appointed and qualified. But in case no city attorney is appointed, or being appointed fails to qualify, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen may, by resolution, employ an attorney or attorneys to perform any legal services required by the City, and pay him or them a reasonable fee or compensation therefor. In case a City Attorney has been appointed, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen may, if they deem it necessary, employ additional counsel and pay them reasonable compensation for any legal services demanded by the City.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the City Attorney to attend to the prosecution of all cases arising under the ordinances of the City of Jackson, prosecute forfeited recognizances and actions for the recovery of debts, fines, penalties, and forfeitures accruing to said city, and shall give, without fee, his opinion to the Mayor, and also to the members of the Board of Aldermen of the City, if required on any question of law growing out of the City ordinances.

He shall draft all necessary ordinances when so requested to do by the Board of Aldermen and report the same to the Board. He shall also draft all necessary contracts and other legal papers and documents as directed by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen. He shall also attend to all legal business of the City of Jackson, and appear for the City in all actions to which the City may be a party, or in which it may be interested, in any and all courts as required by the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen. He shall attend the meetings of the Board of Aldermen, and discharge such other duties as may be enjoined upon him by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen in regard to the legal business.

Section 3. Vacancies Filled—When any vacancy shall occur in the office of City Attorney, by the death, resignation or otherwise, such vacancy shall be filled by the appointment of the Mayor, with the advice and consent of the Board of Aldermen and such appointee shall hold office until his successor is duly appointed and qualified.

Section 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
