

Two Big Meetings of Poultry Raisers.

The State Poultry Board has arranged for two of the greatest gatherings of farmers and poultry raisers ever held in Missouri if not in the entire United States.

The State Poultry Institute will be held at Columbia in the new State Agricultural College December 29 and 30, during Farmers' Week. Three noted poultry lecturers and judges have been engaged to conduct the institute and give practical demonstrations. Dr. A. A. Brigham, principal of the School of Agriculture at Brookings, S. D.; Rolla C. Lawry, professor of Poultry Husbandry in Cornell University; and D. E. Hale, a noted judge and writer, will each be present to instruct the farmers and poultry-raisers in all practical questions pertaining to foods, feeding, incubators, brooding, breeding, caponizing, judging, and general poultry and egg farming, both upon the farm and as a special business. Noted speakers for all branches of agriculture, and the dedication of the new agricultural building on Dec. 31st. Don't miss this meeting.
