

THE WORLD AT LARGE

Items From Home and Abroad, Gathered From Many Sources

The Beard joint resolution to disfranchise negro voters in Florida was adopted by the senate Apr. 30 by a vote of 20 to 10. The resolution now goes to the house. Two years ago a similar measure passed the senate, but was killed in the house. Senator Beard read a letter from Senator Money of Mississippi, commending the attempt to regulate the negro vote. Senator Massey said that, notwithstanding the fact that he was born in Philadelphia, he had lived in Florida long enough to know the wants of its people and to see the need of a change in the constitution to disfranchise the negro. The Beard resolution submits to the voters a constitutional amendment providing that the voters of Florida shall be "white male" persons of the age of 21 years and upward.

The St. Louis and San Francisco railway management gave instructions to its agents to put in effect May 1 the two and one-half cent rate basis for passenger fares in Missouri and Arkansas, with three cents for fares paid on trains. This will be the maximum and minimum basis. It is not understood that competition will be met at points where a lower rate is charged by other lines. Although no official notice was given, it is presumed that the Rock Island will adopt the same course for both states. The Burlington will also establish the two and one-half cent basis in Missouri Saturday Announcement to that effect is expected tomorrow. The other lines will adhere to the two-cent basis for the present.

Malden News: We are reliably informed that during the month of March 1909, that the Frisco train running between Campbell, Mo., and Leachville, Arkansas, and Caruthersville, Mo., and Hayti, carried 15,485 passengers. This is nearly 500 passengers each day, which will average at least 30 cents per each passenger carried, would make \$150.00 per day for that train which will not cost the company over \$50.00 to operate it all day; still the railroads claim that 2 cents per mile is too cheap to carry passengers for.

One of the Missouri bills ordered engrossed, reads as follows: "It shall be unlawful for any person to treat another by buying for or giving in any manner to such other person or persons, any intoxicating drinks at the bar or on premises of any saloon, dramshop or other place where intoxicating liquors are kept on sale. Any person violating the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25 for each offense."

At the annual election of stockholders, of the Dunklin County Publishing Company, April 27, the old board was re-elected as follows: W. F. Shelton, D. B. Pankey, Will A.

Jones, Lee Seelton and E. P. Caruthers. These re-elected, E. P. Caruthers as president, editor and manager; W. F. Shelton, vice-president; D. B. Pankey as treasurer; Will A. Jones as secretary. The business of the company for the past year was shown to have been good.—Dunklin Democrat.

One of the last acts of the sixtieth congress was to give states bordering on the Mississippi river jurisdiction over its waters. In view of this grant of enlarged powers, Gov. Noel of Mississippi paid a visit to Little Rock last week meeting Gov. Donaghey and the legislature and conferred with lawyers regarding the framing of a law to extend the authority of each state to the shore on the opposite side of the river, thus giving officers the power to arrest criminals on any part of the river.

J. F. Smyth, of Caruthersville, who was here, a few days ago, announced that he would take his family to Sweetwater, Texas, soon, and while they might live there, some time, he would still hold Missouri as his home. And, while he will not dispose of his Caruthersville property, he will also hold on to his Dunklin county farm land. He has never given up Dunklin, it seems.—Dunklin Democrat.

Last Wednesday afternoon in a difficulty, on what is known as the John Miles farm, two miles south of Game, Ed Jeffries shot and probably fatally wounded his brother-in-law, J. A. Pierce. The trouble occurred in a dispute over a partnership crop. Jeffries is in jail.

Sacrificing one eye that he might escape total blindness, Congressman Charles A. Crow, of Caruthersville, Mo., submitted to an operation at a hospital in St. Louis, April 30. He probably will recover. Mr. Crow's right eye was removed.

Gov. Hadley Apr. 28, signed the "gun toting" bill introduced by Senator Wilson, and it becomes a law in 90 days after adjournment. Under this law gun toters are to be tried in the circuit court, and in some cases they may be sent to the penitentiary.

Beach Hargis, who killed his father at Jackson, Ky., was sentenced to ninety-nine years in the penitentiary. He will have ample time to repent his terrible crime.

Hon. W. D. Vandiver has accepted the presidency of the Federal Trust Co., a new concern organized last year in St. Louis.
