CAPT. MORRIS DEAD.

Capt. W. H. Morris, one of the old pioneers and familiar landmarks of this country, was stricken with paralysis last Saturday, from the effects of which he died at 12:55 Tuesday afternoon.

Capt. Morris was born in 1834 and married in 1859. He came from Troy, Tenn., to Gayoso, Mo., in 1877, and removed from Gayoso to Hayti in 1900, where he has since resided.

Capt. Morris has been in feeble health for some time, but as he had vitality and physical courage no one expected the end so early. He leaves a devoted wife and four children to mourn his loss, who have the sympathy of a host of friends and acquaintances.

His remains were interred in Woodlawn cemetery Wednesday at 2 p. m., under the auspices of the I. O. O. F., and were followed to their last resting place by a large concourse.

There is much in the life and associations of Capt. Morris that we would be glad to publish, but just at this time we were unable to get the desired information.
