Items From Home and Abroad, Gathered From Many Sources

Dunklin Democrat: It now looks that Dunklin county may get that needed new jail. Wednesday, the county court contracted with W. R. Hall for the lots on which stood the old electric light plant, south of the public square, opposite the Christian church, a frontage of 75 feet with a depth about 150 feet. The deed has been made and is held in escrow, until abstract of title is completed. The court took preliminary steps to sell the old jail site, east of the court house, 12x150 feet, by appointing Sheriff J. W. Timberman as commissioner to sell, with the approval of the court. It is understood that the court will have the property sold in lots to suit the purchaser, probably in five lots, four 25 feet front and one 20 feet front. Some say that there is a standing offer above \$14,000 for the entire property. When the old property is disposed of and the county has the money in its pocket, it will then figure on a new and modern jail. One that will cost about \$20,000 will about fill the bill.

New Madrid Record: It is now too late, by a number of years, to celebrate the centennial of the founding of New Madrid, but there is yet time, if we commence right off, to get up a big blowout to celebrate the completion of the reclamation of all the "sunk lands" in this county.
