COLLAR LINE.

Leo A. Greenwell, owner of the Collar Line Steamers, made the first trip from Caruthersville and Cairo last week, and was highly pleased with the result. The trip was made on the Wenona, and was largely in the form of an excursion, many business men being invited to accompany them on the first trip, and they responded liberally.

Mr. Greenwell came out to Hayti to finish up his business and to prepare to remove his family to Caruthersville, and while here informed us that he had another boat coming to join in the trade, the Columbia, from Devonport, Iowa, the fastest boat on the western waters. It is his intention to keep the service up to the top notch and to keep plenty of boats to handle the trade.

Warehouses have been arranged for at all landings between Caruthersville and Cairo, and competent agents will look after them. The warehouse at Gayoso is in the hands of Charlie Adams, and merchants in Hayti ordering freight by the Collar Line can depend upon having their freight delivered promptly.

The merchants along the river should give these boats a liberal patronage, as the Leo Line has always been very strong and uncompromising, and for a long time almost thought it owned the Mississippi and Ohio rivers, and have, virtually, starved out every line of boats that has been put in against them, simply because the business men along the river would not stand by the new line.

The Wenona will leave Caruthersville every Sunday and Wednesday at 8 a. m., and leaves Cairo on Monday and Thursday at 7 p. m. For rates apply to Leo A. Greenwell, on board.

FRISCO WRECK, NO. 22.

Engineer Killed and Fireman Seriously Hurt--Train Derailed by Running Over Cow.

The Caruthersville and Cape Girardeau passenger train was seriously wrecked, within the yard limits in this city, a little after six o'clock Wednesday morning, instantly killing Engineer "Bullet" Hardin, who was pinned under his engine, and seriously wounding Fireman W. J. Buchanan, both of Cape Girardeau. The fireman was removed to Dr. Trautmann's office for medical attention, and the body of the engineer was recovered about an hour and a half later, frightfully mangled and scalded.

The wreck was caused by the engine striking a cow 18 yards south of the switch in the south yards, coming in from Caruthersville, dragging the cow into the fork of the switch, where the engine was derailed. From this point the engine traveled 100 yards, where it completely changed ends and turned over, with the result stated above. The tender went 13 yards further.

All of the coaches remained on the track and the passengers escaped unhurt.

Hardin died at his post, he had 148 yards in which to leave his train—but it will never be known what opportunities or impossibilities were before him. It is said the air would not work.

Drainage District No. 8.

The Caruthersville Democrat says: One of the greatest steps in the progress of Pemiscot county was taken last Monday, when the contract for digging the ditches in Drainage District No. 8 was let to the Michigan Construction Co. of Coon, Iowa.

The district is one of the largest organized districts in the county, being composed of one main ditch 30 miles long and 29 lateral ditches, with a total of 73 miles. The construction of these ditches will require the moving of 2,583,073 cubic yards of earth, at a total cost of \$224,004.45. It is estimated that three years will be required to do the work.

The ditch commences in the northeast corner of the county and runs diagonally across to the southwest corner.


