OUR COUNTY SCHOOLS.

Concord, Dry Bayou and Stanley schools have united in a joint entertainment to be given on Friday night before Christmas. With such a large number of pupils the teachers are promising an excellent program.

Tyler is the first school to have pupils complete five months of perfect attendance and punctuality thereby securing the large certificates of award. Seven such certificates were sent to Tyler this week. Larry Gillon is their teacher.

The salaries of the teachers of Pemiscot county furnish some interesting statistics. The 17 men who are teaching receive an average salary of \$74 a month. The fifty-six women teaching receive an average salary of \$53.50. These salaries are equalled in but a few counties in the state and show that the teachers are not so poorly paid after all. Only one man is paid less than \$69. Three one-room schools pay \$65, and four two-room schools pay their principal \$72.00. But six teachers in the county receive less than \$50 for their work.

The Chute school had 22 pupils in attendance when inspected. This is less than one-third of the enrollment. It is a question whether or not it is better to continue school through the cotton season or to close for a while. Unquestionably it is better for those who are not obliged to stop. But it is impossible for many people to do without the labor of their children at this time. And we think that the de-arrangement and confusion incident to the return of so many pupils who have been absent for six or eight weeks is worse than that caused by a vacation.

Clella Liles, the teacher of the Chute, is doing excellent work with the pupils who are attending. The pupils are very much interested in their work and as a result are studious and progressing rapidly. However, we anticipate much work and worry for Mrs. Liles in classifying and arranging the forty or fifty pupils who will be coming back to school soon.
